PAVING PAYS IN NORTHWEST CITIES

(Evening Roseburg, (Oregon) Review, November 3, 1909.)

Our paved streets are appreciated more than ever since the rainy weather has begun—but we won't notice the rain fall so much now, as the pavement will be dry most of the time, even during the winter. It is now time to begin figuring on more than doubling the paved area already year. Among the extensions already talked of are seven blocks on Lane street, from Main to the Langqua river bridge; one block on Main, from Lane to Cass, to connect with the present paving on that street; two blocks on Jackson, to reach the Deer creek bridge; three blocks on Oak, from Jackson to the railroad track; two blocks each on Pine and Stephens, from Oak to Lane; three blocks on Rose, from Lane to Washington, and one block on Washington, from Rose to Jackson. This is 21 blocks and does not include probable extensions south to Mosher street on Jackson and Rose, and probably still further on Stephens and Pine, and several blocks on Mill. Extensions east from Jackson are expected on Oak and Washington one block each, and two on Cass. Residents on East and West Douglas street, Ella street, in the Chadwick addition, and one or more blocks north of the Deer creek bridge are also earnestly discussing paving extensions. Yes, we should have between 30 and 40 blocks more of paving next year. Salem started with three blocks in 1907. It now has 27 blocks paved and 15 more contracted. They expect to add 37 more to this more to this next year, making a total of 77 blocks. Eugene now has over 60 blocks paved, and is adding more. All find it is a big paying investment.

COUNCIL SCRAPS OVER BAD STREET

Grants Pass Councilmen Have Wordy War Over Condition of Road to the Graveyard

Grants Pass, Nov. 9.—(Special.)—It has leaked out that the last meeting of the city council was a red-hot one, and all because George Cronk, the councilman for the Fourth ward, made a speech. What started him was the deplorable condition of A street, where the city is attempting to macadamize a strip 16 feet wide in the center and about five blocks long. The rock crusher will not work and the gasoline road roller is unfit for any purpose. The last time they tried to use it it sank through the rock and up to the axle in mud, and the street commissioner had to get the street to pry it out. Since the rains have commenced a loaded wagon cannot get near the rock crusher. All this was brought out by Cronk, who was not exactly disinterested, as he is sexton and has to travel this street to and from the graveyard.

Bitulithic Not Slippery
