The safe was not molested.

The burglars left a monkey wrench and chisel, both hand-made. It was thought they came from Dawson's blacksmith shop, as they were made by a smith, and are such as are used in a blacksmith shop, but Mr. Dawson, the only blacksmith in town, says they are not from his place. It is hoped that they may be the means of locating the culprits.

ABRAHAM DOES NOT

WANT RECEIVERSHIP

Riddle, the Likely Man. He Thinks; H. C. Allen Out for Roseburg Regisanship

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 25.—Senator Albert Abraham, of this city, whose name has been frequently mentioned in connection with the receivership of the United States land office, to succeed J. M. Lawrence, emphatically denied yesterday that he has been or is a candidate for that position. He expressed the belief that George W. Riddle, this county, is the man whom Senator Bourne will recommend for the office, if he has not already done so. Riddle is a pioneer in Republican politics in this county, and there has been a campaign of any moment in which he did not take an active part. He is a politician of the so-called reform type, being a staunch advocate of Statehood No. 1 and of the initiative and referendum. At the general primaries in 1905 Riddle was defeated for the nomination for joint representative from Douglas and Jackson counties.

For the receivership of the land office, to succeed B. L. Eddy, there is only one active candidate. That the public knows anything about. He is C. Allen, who has forwarded a petition liberally signed to Senator Bourne. Allen was formerly a clerk in the land office here, but is now stationed at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. He is a son-in-law of ex-Representative Waggoner, of Corvallis, a consistent and warm supporter of Bourne.

LOOK FOR ECLIPSE

OF MOON TONIGHT

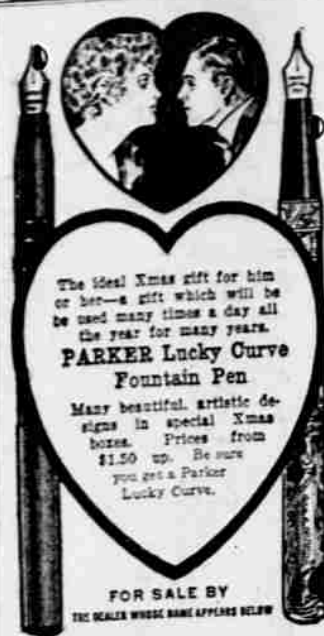
Satellite Will Be Hidden From 11 p. m. to 2:28 a. m.

"If the sky is clear tonight, a total eclipse of the moon will be visible from here. It will begin at 11 o'clock and last for more than two hours and a half. The schedule, as prepared for San Francisco, which will vary but little with that for this part of the country, announces that the shadow of the earth will begin to move upon the moon at one minute after 11 o'clock tonight. The entire face of the moon will be covered by 12:03 o'clock, and the shadow will begin to leave by 1:25 o'clock tomorrow morning. The eclipse will end at 2:28 o'clock.

This will be the second total eclipse of the moon this year, both visible from this city. Fear is felt that the moon, during the time of the eclipse, will be hidden by clouds.
