TO IMPROVE BREEDS OF HOGS AND HUMANS

American Breeders' Association
Convenes at Omaha,
Neb., Today

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 8.—To improve the breeds of hogs and humans, cattle and corn, and other animals and cereals, some of the most distinguished scientists of the country assembled today at the convention of the American Breeders' Association. Heredity is the principal topic of discussion, and under this general theme many important discoveries are expected to be announced. It is declared that the delegates to this convention have a wider knowledge of heredity than was contained in all the libraries of the world only a decade or two ago. It is expected that "eugenics," which is a new name for a new science having to do with "breeding better babies," of the human species, will occupy much time and attention.

A dozen years ago even the universities did not teach much on the subject of heredity because not enough was known to justify instruction. Divided into more than a score of committees, the leaders of the American Breeders' Association have been making a sweeping investigation of the laws of nature as applied to heredity. While one committee is investigating fish breeding, another experiments with roses; still another committee of scientists seeks information on breeding fur-bearing animals that they might be improved, while David Starr Jordan heads a committee on "eugenics," and will report on heredity in the human race.

All the various committees have presented reports to the present convention. They show heredity, like electricity, is coming rapidly into man's hand to increase production. They say it is an energy, which when harnessed, will give the United States \$2,000,000,000 of new wealth each year on the farms of the country alone. Electrical energy has given the world millions—heredity is a force capable of giving the world more wealth than electricity, says the committee of this association.

Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson heads this organization, while Willett M. Hays, the assistant secretary, is one of the organizers and its executive secretary. William George, of Aurora, Ill., gives it his influence and financial support; Luther Burbank contributes to the reports; while James J. Hill, railroad builder of the Northwest, is one of the speakers at the meeting.

Mr. Hill is expected to deliver his address tomorrow, at a joint session of the American Breeders' Association and the National Corn Exposition Association.

BALTIMORE BELLE TO WED TODAY

Baltimore, Dec. 8.—Miss Martha Lee Jenkins, daughter of Mrs. Edmund Plowden Jenkins, and one of the most famous beauties of Baltimore, will be married today to Clifford Stanley Sims. A great stir was caused in local society last month when Mr. Sims secured a license to wed Miss Jenkins and returned it to the court clerk within an hour. It was explained that the mother of the young lady objected to a hasty marriage, which, it is believed, was contemplated. Mr. Sims lived in Baltimore many years as general manager of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, and is known in railway circles throughout the country. He is a son of the late Judge Clifford S. Sims, of the supreme court of New Jersey.

The ceremony will be performed at the Stafford Hotel, where Mrs. Jenkins has taken a suite of rooms for the occasion. The Rev. Louis O'Donovan, of the cathedral, will be the officiating priest, and Cardinal Gibbons will give his blessing. Mrs. Jenkins will give her daughter away, and Mr. Sims will be attended by his brother as best man. The wedding will be a quiet one, with only the two families present.
