FIVE CENSUS ENUMERATORS FOR EUGENE

State Superintendent Hendricks
Here Today Arranging for
Count in This City

R. J. Hendricks, superintendent of the
United States census for Oregon, was
in Eugene this forenoon for the pur-
pose of arranging with the Communi-
cal Club in regard to the number of
census takers for this city. He re-
turned to Salem on the noon train.
It was practically agreed between
Mr. Hendricks and Manager Hartog,
of the club, that there will be five
enumerators for the city. They will
be selected at a later date from a list
of applicants, some of whom have al-
ready applied for the job. Some but
the best of men for the purpose will
be chosen, thus insuring a complete
enumeration of the people of Eugene.
Mr. Hendricks is editor and own-
er of the statesman, Salem's leading
paper. He will have entire charge of
the taking of the census in Oregon.

HENEY RESIGNS; SUSE

H. R. CROCKER FOR LIBEL
San Francisco, Dec. 7.—Francis J.
Honey today resigned as assistant
district attorney. His resignation was
accepted, and Robert H. Duke, at
present prosecutor in the police
court, was appointed in Honey's
stead.

San Francisco, Dec. 7.—Francis J.
Honey announced today that he had
brought suit in New York for \$250,-
000 damages, alleging libel and de-
famation of character, against Wil-
liam H. Crocker, president of the
Crocker National Bank, of San Fran-
cisco, basing the action on a letter
signed by Crocker and printed in the
New York Evening Post December 3,
alleging that Honey employed criminal
methods in conducting the prosecu-
tions. Crocker was served with the
papers in New York today.

RAIL RECORD BETWEEN CHICAGO AND NEW YORK

New York, Dec. 7.—All household
records between New York and Chicago
on the New York Central Railroad
for passenger trains was broken to-
day by the special train carrying Sam-
uel Newhouse, of Salt Lake City, here
on his trip to catch a steamer for
Europe, where a brother is dying.
The train traveled the distance in
17 hours and 44 minutes, as against
18 hours, which the Twentieth Cen-
tury limited makes.

This record was made by the New-
house special in spite of the fact that
it lost 45 minutes by the disablement
of an engine at Hudson, N. Y.

The West-bound record is still held
by the Vanderbilt special, which made
the run to Chicago, March 28 last,
in 16 hours and eight minutes.
The run of 842 miles from Chicago
to Albany was made today in 830
minutes. An especially fine bit of
running was that between Rochester
and Syracuse, the 85 miles being
covered in 75 minutes.

NEWELL DENIES

CHARGES OF GRAFT

T. H. Newell, head of the post-
office service of the United States,
has issued a lengthy statement de-
nying charges of graft in connection
with the Klamath, Oregon, project.
In conclusion he says:

"This matter has been frequently
and thoroughly gone over by the var-
ious secretaries of the interior, and
its repudiation at this time is a
great injustice to the late Secretary
Hitchcock, who cannot reply, and
others who are now unable to combat
the facts to a reply. Those charges
have aroused but little interest, un-
less the project itself, especially among
those who know that all the facts
were made public and approved for a
representative body of those interest-
ed before the purchases were made,
and also that all charges of graft
had been specifically and publicly
withdrawn."
