WILL ENJOY CHRISTMAS

S. K. Noel, the Springfield miller, can enjoy Christmas this winter. Over a month ago he purchased 13,000 bushels of hard wheat, mostly the blue stem variety, at a price below a dollar. The cost of shipment here was 7 cents a bushel. The price of this wheat now ranges in Portland from \$1.15 to \$1.20 and there are few prospects of it going down. Along with this raise the price of hard wheat flour is going up. When it is a matter of 13,000 bushels a few cents per bushel makes quite a difference. This will help toward that new automobile.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Many people in Springfield do not know that there is a public library in the city. The library was established over a year ago by a small gift and the enterprising work of some loyal ladies. At present the library has several hundred books of its own besides those it receives from the state as a traveling library. It is open Saturdays in the city hall building. The librarian is Mrs. Kester and her assistant is Mrs. Page.

This afternoon and this evening a bazaar is being held for the benefit of the library's new book fund. The general admission is 10 cents. This should be attended by all who wish to show their appreciation for the good work that is being done in this line. It is seldom that a library can maintain itself without outside help in a city of this size.

RECORD SHIPMENT

MADE TO NATRON

The record daily shipment to Natron was made yesterday when 21 cars of lumber and ties and one car of supplies went up. The lumber came from Wendling where the greater part of the lumber used by the Utah Construction company is bought. Besides this, two car loads of workmen were shipped in. The ties sound more like a railroad than anything else that has gone in for some time. However the most of these are for the contractors' rock roads. No heavy rails having been sent in.

Springfield Brevities.

Died December 9, 1909, Mrs. W. H. Swearingen, from cancer of the breast. The funeral was held today from Walker's undertaking parlors, interment at Laurel Grove cemetery.

Stinson and Co. have completed a \$400 plumbing contract for the Utah Construction Co. at Natron. All the company's buildings at the new city have been connected with water and sewer. Sanitation is one of the points that they are very careful of.

Springfield is beginning to have a few metropolitan names. The post office delivers mail to Rockfellow and Carnegie. The former is a new arrival.

The river came up very suddenly yesterday morning but stopped before it reached a dangerous height and has been at a standstill since. The cold prevented the snow from melting. If it had stayed warm there would have been another flood.

The railroad has a force of bridge carpenters at work strengthening the bridge which was damaged by the high water. They have their car in which they live, stationed near the shingle mill. When they have completed their work here they move on to the next bridge or trestle and inspect and make repairs where necessary.

A force of men are at work clearing the drift from in front of the approaches of the two bridges. Several logs are being split into cordwood, the rest burned.

Lights have been placed along the streetcar trestle from the hop house to the stairs at the former end of the line.

HAMILTON DEFENSE

REQUESTS ACQUITTAL

Olympia, Wash., Dec. 9.—The defense in the trial of former Adjutant-General Otis Hamilton, who is accused of embezzling \$50,000 from the state military fund, today moved the court to instruct the jury to return a verdict of not guilty on the ground that the evidence presented by the state had not proved the crime of embezzlement, which is the one upon which Hamilton is being tried.

The argument will occupy most of the day and Judge Mitchell is expected to take the question under advisement when it is formally submitted to him.
