GENERAL GREELY

FORCED TO QUIT

North Pole Controversy Reason for Resignation of Presidency

New York, Dec. 11.—The Cook-Pearry controversy has led to the resignation of General A. W. Greely from the Explorer's club, of which he was president before Commander Peary was elected to that position. Peary is now president.

General Greely's letter of resignation was a brief, formal document in which no reason for his action was given, but it is a matter of general knowledge among men interested in exploration that General Greely thinks the Explorer's Club is dominated by Peary partisans.

When Dr. Cook first claimed to have discovered the North Pole, the Explorer's club invited him to a dinner to be given while the Hudson-Fulton celebration was on. Then Commander Peary came out with his claim of discovery and assertion that Dr. Cook was an impostor and the Peary faction in the club succeeded in having the proposed dinner called off. General Greely expressed his opinion at the time in no unmistakable terms. General Greely, himself an Arctic explorer of experience and reputation, has stood staunchly by Dr. Cook in this controversy. The announcement made today by Secretary Harry D. Walsh was a great surprise.

SENATOR RAYNER DEMANDS PUNISHMENT OF ZELAYA FOR MURDER OF AMERICANS

Washington, Dec. 13.—Speaking of his resolution, offered in the senate Friday, authorizing the president of the United States to take all necessary steps to apprehend President Zelaya and bring him to trial for the murder of Groce and Cannon, the Americans recently executed in Nicaragua, Senator Rayner today addressed the senate at length. Rayner's speech was stirring and denunciatory in tone, and characterized by dramatic fervor, and was an unsparring arraignment of Zelaya, whom he designated as one of the greatest criminals of the age.

Of the president of Nicaragua Rayner said: "In the school of dishonor, corruption, perfidy and crime, he stands without a peer and exhibits in one glow of associated harmony the pride of every model and the perfection of every master." "Of the execution of Groce and Cannon the speaker said: "This act is not only the act of a fiend, but an insult to the honor of this republic, and cannot remain un-

HURRYING WORK ON KLAMATH END

Klamath Falls, Or., Dec. 11.—Andrew Erickson, railroad contractor, has taken a subcontract to build the last 12 miles of the 25 miles of track to be built from Klamath Falls to

Sprague river, by Erickson & Peterson. LABOR LEADERS IN CONFERENCE AT PITTSBURG

American Federation Considers Present and Pending Strikes

Pittsburg, Dec. 13.—An important conference of labor leaders is in session here today under the auspices of the American Federation of Labor, Gompers presiding. The meeting will discuss the "open shop" order of the United States Steel corporation, the switchmen's strike in the north-west, the impending strike of the Big Four railroad telegraphers, the lock-out of the glass blowers and other matters affecting labor.

Trainmen Still Out.

St. Paul, Dec. 13.—Members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen did not return to work today as expected. They decided to postpone action until tomorrow, at the urgent request of President Hawley of the switchmen's union.

There is more talk of a compromise board today. President Gompers, it is said, has recommended such a step to President Hawley of the switchmen's union, and a member of the strike committee said a compromise was being considered in the following basis: wages, three cents an hour increase, instead of six; overtime, time and a half instead of double, holidays and Sundays to be included as overtime. Age limit and physical examination to be modified to a limited extent, instead of radical changes. Hawley declined to make a statement.

Freight Yards Cleared. Seattle, Dec. 13.—Operating officials of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific state that those roads began business today with all freight cleared up for the first time since the switchmen's strike.

CORPORATIONS HEED NEW TAX MEASURE

Washington, Dec. 12.—More than 400,000 corporations in the United States will have to make their returns in conformity with the new corporation tax law. Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh has issued a comprehensive statement for the government of those corporation officials. The statement is calculated to cover any question of classification and distinction which might arise in the making of the reports, and it sets forth in terse language what the government expects. The statement begins plainly with:

the statement that the government expects returns to be made to conform with the intent of the law, and that the law had two intents—first, that it should be a revenue producer for the government, and second, to levy a tax of 1 per cent on the net income of corporations as provided in the law.
