New York, Dec. 11.—A cable dispatch from London says James J. Corbett sailed for home today. He is returning to the United States to train Jim Jeffries for his fight with Jack Johnson. Speaking of the fight Corbett said:

"If Jeffries can get back into the form he showed when he beat me, he will make short work of Johnson, who, in my opinion, is lucky to hold the championship. He struck a time when there were really no big men. I am certain he would never have been champion if he had been called upon to meet such fighters as John L. Sullivan, Slavin, Joe Goddard or Fitzsimmons."

The building is large enough for practice, and the only disadvantage it has is its distance and lack of suitable baths and accommodations.

### CLASH OCCURS OVER O. A. C. DANCE

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Dec. 11.—Owing to a misunderstanding with the physical director, E. D. Angell, the military ball, the foremost social event of the year, which is in progress tonight, came nearly having to be postponed. As in former years, the students expected to be allowed the use of the armory Friday afternoon for a practice dance and to get the floor in condition. Just before assembly drill yesterday morning, the physical director informed the committee that the armory would be needed for basketball and for physical culture classes, and would not be available for the dance until Saturday afternoon. On the strength of this announcement the dance had been postponed, when the city council and the Coffee Club came to the rescue of the cadets and offered the fine floor of the city hall for the affair.

The faculty had been willing for the event to take place, and the only obstacle was the action of the physical director. The O. A. C. Harmonizer, the college weekly, got out an extra, describing the situation, which was followed by a later edition, giving the good news of the action of the city council.

## PAVEMENT ALWAYS BEST INVESTMENT

Property Values Increase and New Buildings Follow Its Laying

"Hard-surface pavements, though coming rather high are the best investments the property owners of Portland can make," said W. H. Mall, a real estate man of the city, this week. He has recently secured a hard pavement for several blocks along East Burnside street, and a-ir-day notes pleasing results. He says:

"Modern buildings speedily follow the laying of hard pavements, and values of lots increase out of all proportion to the cost of the pavement. Old buildings quickly disappear, new ones are constructed in their places and the face of the entire thoroughfare improved in a very short period. This is noticeable along East Burnside street, Hawthorne avenue, Belmont street, Grand avenue and Union avenue, whose property owners would never go back to the old days of macadam or gravel."

"Portland has been hauling soft rock to its streets in the summer time and carting it off again in the winter for a good many years, and the expense of keeping the macadam in a presentable condition has been enormous. At the same time the streets never looked well, and strangers were always remarking on their bad condition."

"Ask any of the old mossbacks who opposed the improvement of the recently paved streets, and they will now tell you that they are sorry they opposed it. They see values going up around them, and they note the better class of residents hard pavement streets attract to a street. Portland has long since outgrown her macadam days, and I hope never to see one of our streets paved with crushed rock again."—Portland Evening Telegram.

### ASHLAND APPLE ORCHARD IS SOLD

Ashland, Or., Dec. 11.—A 300-acre apple orchard, 40 of it in bearing, the remainder set to fruit trees within the past year or two, three miles from Ashland, known as the E. Patterson orchards has been sold for \$50,000, the purchasers being D. W. Meier, of Toledo, O., and A. D. Graham, of Detroit.

They will subdivide most of it into small holdings and sell to home-seekers.
