SPRINGFIELD AND VICINITY

COMMERCIAL CLUB ELECTION TOMORROW

Tomorrow evening Springfield has another election on its hands, but this one is of somewhat less rivalry, although scarcely less important than the last one. The annual election of officers for the Springfield commercial body will be held in the club parlors December 17. This event will mark several changes in the personnel of the executive staff for one of two resignations are expected, while President Kestly has moved from the city. There has been little discussion over prospective candidates, and little opposition for any office is expected.

The present club, during the past year, has done more for Springfield than many expensive trained boosters would have done. Systematic correspondence with prospective citizens has been kept up, while thousands of sheets of literature have been carefully distributed from New York to 'Frisco. Besides this, the greater work has been the every day local work that counts. The club has had an influencing hand in nearly every improvement or matter of advantage to the city.

Too much credit cannot be given to the officers, who have labored unpaid, spending their time and energy for the benefit of the city. This especially applies to the office of secretary. He has handled all the communications, which involves thousands of letters, each of which takes valuable time. This has been done carefully and practically without pay. It is doubtful under the same circumstances if such an efficient man can be found to take his place. This is an office that has grown to require a salary with an additional stenographer. It is only a question of time before this will be necessary, for although it is all very nice to be loyal to one's city, time is reckoned in money. The present officers are:

OLD MAN DIES AND GRANDSON DISAPPEARS

A strange case, which has a slight mystery about it, was developed by the death of the old man, W. Edgeworth, who was taken sick while in Springfield on his way to Portland by wagon with his grandson, and by the disappearance of the young man. The old man died at the hospital in Eugene, and the burial was delayed until late yesterday afternoon awaiting the arrival of the grandson. He was buried in Laurel Grove cemetery at the expense of the county by Undertaker Walker. The service was conducted by Rev. Harbott.

The last days of the man's life were spent in delirium, and on Friday he did not recognize the boy. The last seen of him was Saturday morning about 11 o'clock, driving with his team toward Eugene. Efforts made since then to locate him or relatives of the dead man have been unsuccessful. While the man was sick he mentioned something of a son or brother living either in Portland or some place in Washington or Michigan.

It seems hard to believe that the young man, who gave a good impression while here, could have skipped out just to avoid funeral or hospital expenses.

WHAT, THE POPULATION OF SPRINGFIELD ONLY 3000?

Springfield has a population of 3,000? The last mark of punctuation is to indicate surprise, no doubt, for by estimating from the school census the figures are true. If Eugene can figure 12,000 by her school population, her neighbor has one fourth that. The school census was given as 769. One hundred and twelve of these are outside of the city limits, which leaves 657. If multiplied by five, which is the accepted ratio, the population would be 3285, but a more conservative ratio sometimes is given at four and one-half. This gives 2,956. This can be partially explained by the recent additions to the city limits, while the rest is pure growth.

Springfield three years ago was the fourth city in Lane county, now it is second. This certainly is a showing to be proud of.

Springfield City Notes

A pack train of several horses and two men passed through the streets yesterday afternoon. They are from Eastern Oregon and are headed north.

The Northwestern Corporation's electricians are stringing light wires to the new Fischer-Bally sawmill north of the city. They will soon be cutting lumber.

The new voltmeter that has been installed in the light plant records on paper every minute's variation of the electro-motive force during the entire 24 hours. A reel of paper is turned past a fountain pen at a certain speed, regulated by an electrically corrected clock. The pen is moved across this strip as the current varies. The paper is divided into hours and minutes, and ruled its length to indicate volts. If the voltage remains constant the pen records a straight line at the proper place on the paper for such a voltage. Every variation moves it backward or forward. The instrument is very sensitive, and under a heavy load will move every time a street car starts or stops. The path of the pen during the day when only one turbine is running is similar to the path of a sport heavily under the influence of Springfield near-beer.

Oregon City, Or., Dec. 15.—Based upon a ratio of four and a half times the number of children of school age in Oregon City, there is a population of 6675 here, more than 800 in excess of the number shown by the census several months ago. The total number of school children between 4 and 20 is 1350.

The census of 1900 gave Oregon City fewer than 4000.
