CITY TALKS OF EXTENDING THE LIMITS

Question Came Up for Discus-
sion at Council Meeting—
New Near-Beer Law

At last night's adjourned meeting of the city council an ordinance was passed declaring a place where near-beer, or any other beverage containing sufficient alcohol to produce intoxication, was sold to be a nuisance and providing a penalty of from \$25 to \$200 fine. The city's ordinance prohibiting the sale of near-beer was recently declared unconstitutional and the ordinance declaring places where liquor is sold or stored for sale a nuisance has recently been upheld by the supreme court. Under these rulings the council thinks this new ordinance will stick.

The matter of a site for a city hall was discussed. L. E. Bean was employed by the council to examine the records to ascertain the rights of the city to the land where the city hall now stands, and it was decided to ask the county court to appoint an attorney to assist in the work.

Extend City Limits
The question of extension of the city limits, before the next federal census is taken, was discussed. The law was read, in which it is stated that a petition of one-fifth of the voters in the territory affected is necessary, and then the council may call a special election.

Minor Matters
The council passed an ordinance to grade and gravel Olive street, from West Twelfth to West Seventh.

Hon. J. J. Walton appeared before the council in regard to the lumber sawed by Free Thomas for the power flume, asking that the city pay for the lumber. He stated that Thomas would give a bond for proper finishing of the lumber. The matter was finally referred to the fire and water committee. Mr. Walton also spoke on the matter of maintaining an arc light at the mill race bridge on East Ninth street. This matter was also referred.

E. Whittam was granted a segregation of assessment for a sewer in the south part of the city.

The question of building dykes along the millrace was referred.

The matter of drains and backs standing on Willamette street was referred.

The superintendent of the water department and street commissioner were authorized to have the wood on the city land across the river from the pumping station cut up for city use.

Sidewalks were ordered put in on Adams and Olive streets, and on Harrison avenue.

A petition for a sewer in the alley between Washington and Jefferson streets, from Second to Cheshire, was referred to the sewer committee.

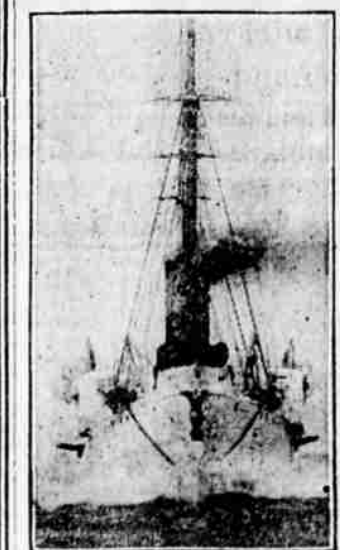
Recorder Bryson reported that \$175.65 interest on an early issue of sewer bonds was due January 1. Payment was authorized. He further reported that there are \$245,000 of water bonds outstanding, and semi-annual interest of \$6125 will be due on January 1. A warrant for the interest and exchange were ordered drawn.

The city attorney was directed to draw an ordinance providing that all stated salaries of city employees be paid on the first of each month. Hereafter, each employee has been paid for a month at a time from the date of beginning of service for the city. The recorder and finance committee were directed to compute the balance due each employee to January 1.

The city attorney reported \$400 road poll tax collected.

The United States ship Yorktown, sent to Nicaraguan waters when the situation between President Zelaya and the United States became acute, is a gunboat twenty years old. She carries fourteen small guns, the biggest being six inch ones. Her crew consists of about 200 men.

NEWS OF COBURG FROM THE JOURNAL

C. P. Clower made a business trip to Eugene on Monday.

Smart and son have rented the slaughter house and grounds east of the city and are handling hogs and manufacturing special sugar cured country hams, bacon, lard, etc. The members of the firm have been residents of Coburg for many years and had dealt in the meat market for about two years, when they sold out.

Last Wednesday afternoon occurred the trial of the City of Roseburg vs. C. E. Mercer, for violating the peddling ordinance, before Recorder Brown. Mr. Mercer was represented by a Portland lawyer, Mr. Sewall. After the usual preliminaries the city presented its case to the court. After a short trial the case was rested and the court found Mr. Mercer guilty and fined him \$10 and costs for violating an ordinance relating to obtaining a license to sell goods.—Coburg Journal.

The circuit court for Jackson county is in session, and is just now engaged in the trial of County Judge J. R. Nell, Sheriff W. A. Jones, Attorney W. E. Phipps and Mrs. Victor E. Snyder, on a complaint for damages to the amount of \$20,000 brought by J. H. Harriman for false imprisonment in the county jail. Harrington was put in jail on a charge of contempt of court.

The postoffice department's report, just issued, shows receipts at 50 of the largest offices for November, shows an increase for all offices. Portland ranks fourth with 29.06 per cent.
