AGRICULTURAL COURSE AT THE HIGH SCHOOL

Graduate From O. A. C. Will
Probably Be Accepted to
Direct the Course

After establishing a complete commercial course and beginning a pedagogy class that will shortly lead to a two years' normal course, Principal Hug is planning a course in agriculture for the Eugene High school that will bring many of the Lane county students home from the O. A. C. and serve the many farmers' boys and girls that are attending in Eugene.

Mr. Hug has worked on the plan for some time, and when in Corvallis a short time ago talked the matter over with President Kerr, who approved of and seemed pleased with the plan.

The course will be similar to that given at O. A. C. and also in many of the High schools of the East and Middle West, notably Kansas. The first semester's work deals with three topics, farm animals, which studies the nature and care of every animal, from the horse to the pig; milk and its products, and soils. The second semester continues with soils, then takes up the subject of field crops, and lastly orchard and garden crops. The subject will require little equipment and will be carried on in connection with the science courses. A graduate from O. A. C. will possibly be secured as instructor.

Student Body Meeting
At a student body meeting at the High school yesterday afternoon the 1909 football men were presented with their "E's", a football manager for 1910 was chosen and a resolution brought up to limit only those who have earned their "E's" and sweaters to wear the emblems. Clay Watson was the choice for football manager. The students who received "E's" for the first time were: Bradshaw, Noland, Porter, Sims, Morrison, Griffin and DeBar; others who already have earned the emblem: Koch, Dustin, Pengra, Rae, Jenkins and Preston.

The resolution in regard to wearing the emblems was the result of the growing custom of the men allowing them to be worn by their girl friends.

Inquiries from Salem
Professor George Hug, principal of the High school, has received an inquiry from Salem High school as to what was done in Eugene with the students who failed in the six weeks' report in two or more subjects. The Salem authorities are considering the plan of dropping all these students, as is done at the University of Oregon at the end of each semester who have failed to pass in nine hours.

This problem has been solved in the High school here by the system recently introduced, having personal attention from the teachers to their assigned number of students. When a pupil fails below in any subject it is reported each week to his or her instructor, and this teacher investigates the reason, if necessary visiting the parents, and giving personal help where needed. For the short time this has been worked the number of flunkers has been greatly reduced, and at the last six weeks' report there were not a few who had "E's" in two or more subjects.

Girls' Gymnasium
The attic of the High school is being fitted up for a girls' gymnasium, which will be open at the first of the next semester. Dr. Stewart, dean of women at the University, for a couple of months will devote a couple of hours each day as an instructor until the High school teachers, probably Emily Muhr, can carry on the work.

The girls' gym is needed in the High school more than anywhere else, as the High school period is generally the critical point in the girls' life. It is not infrequent that a girl breaks down before she finishes her course, and stooped shoulders about the school evidence the need of such a course.

The plan is for the first semester to have the gym work optional, but next year it will probably be made required.

Miss Muhr is now visiting the schools of Portland and intermediate points to get new ideas and pointers, especially on the parents' co-operative system now being advocated here.
