MANY SMALL COINS IN RURAL MAIL BOXES

Carriers on Free Delivery Routes Find Them by Hundreds

Rural mail carriers in Eastern states are given much trouble in picking up small coins put in mail boxes for purchase of stamps. The difficulty has become so great that a special circular has been issued from the postmaster-general's office to all of the postmasters of the country, urging the patrons of rural delivery routes to not burden carriers too much in this manner. The circular says:

"From a recent count made in one of the counties of New York by rural carriers of coins deposited by patrons in their boxes for the purchase of stamp supplies, it was found that each carrier in the county was collecting on an average of 115 1-cent coins each week. This average applied to all the routes in operation throughout the country would give the enormous total of about 300,000,000 1-cent coins.

"As most of these coins are deposited loose in the boxes, it is desirable that you and the rural carriers, in a tactful and polite way, put forth your best efforts to induce patrons to provide themselves with stamp supplies in advance of their needs, and to equip their boxes with suitable coin-holding receptacles. It should be explained to patrons that the picking of loose coins from boxes not only results in needless hardship and suffering to carriers in wintry weather, delays the delivery and collection of the mails, but frequently results in actual money loss to the carriers, for in collecting coins from boxes they drop them into the snow or on the ground without recovery, and are required to replace them out of their own funds."

RECENT STRIKE AT FAIRVIEW VERIFIED

Cottage Grove, Or., Dec. 26.—The recent strike made on the North Fairview mine of Bohemia has been verified by the foreman, Jack Klopfenstein, who arrived here recently. He said that they tapped the ledge about 70 feet below the previous rich ore deposit unearthed about a month ago. This find, he says, is the richest and largest body of ore yet found on the property.

Four distinct rich free gold places have been opened within 200 feet from the grass roots. The last find shows a greater percentage of free gold than the openings above. The gold is interwoven with quartz and galena and is very rich.

A mining expert says the grade of ore is as promising as any he has seen from Colorado to the Pacific coast. He is positive the values that have been found near the surface will run down from 2000 to 3000 feet.

NO SHIPMENT OF BOOZE BY EXPRESS

National Law Goes Into Effect After the First of the Year

Washington, Dec. 25.—On and after January 1, 1910, the importation of liquor into prohibition states must be carried on openly and above board. No longer may the user of whiskey, beer or wines import for his own use any of the drinkables unless the package in which they are shipped is plainly marked on the cover, showing the nature and extent of the liquid contents. This is one of the requirements of the new interstate liquor law, which was incorporated in the penal code passed at the last regular session of congress.

The new law is the first fruit of the long-continued campaign waged by the prohibitionists before congress. It is not all that they asked, but they regard it as a great victory, as they are confident that the new enactment will aid materially all "dry" states in the enforcement of their local liquor laws. It will enable the prohibition states to keep track of all liquor imported from another state or from abroad, and in that way to render it easier to check the sales of intoxicants in communities where such traffic is unlawful.

AGENTS MAY NOT COLLECT

Sections 238, 239 and 240 of the penal code, which becomes effective on the first of January, impose new restrictions upon the interstate shipment of liquor, and while applicable to shipments from any state or territory to any other state or territory, or from a foreign country to any state or territory, are chiefly important as they bear upon shipments into prohibition states. Not only do these sections of the code require the plain marking of packages containing liquor, but they put an end to the practice of express and freight agents acting as collectors for liquor dealers, and also put a stop to anonymous shipments, and do away with the C. O. D. liquor traffic, all of which practices have been effective barriers to the successful enforcement of state prohibition laws.

GOOD ROUTE FOUND FOR PROPOSED ROUTE

Burns, Or., Dec. 25.—The surveying parties employed for the past four or five months to survey a railroad line through Malheur Pass for William Hanley and C. E. S. Wood, have been called in till the winter is over. The surveyors found a good grade up Malheur Pass, claimed to be much better than the Oregon Eastern line through Crane Creek Gap, which was an 8-10 grade. The surveyors will probably be put back to work early in the spring to survey a line to a junction with the Oregon Trunk, near Bend. The Hanley and Wood people have purchased several important places along the Malheur river to hold the right-of-way down that stream, and it is the supposition here that they will begin construction work next year through Malheur canyon.
