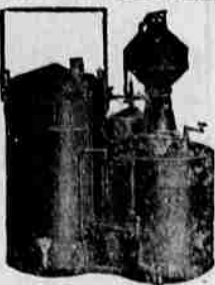

STUDENT VOLUNTEERS HOLD CONVENTION AT ROCHESTER, N. Y.

Sixth International Meeting Convenes to Discuss Foreign Missions

Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 29.—The Sixth International Convention of the Students' Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions, regarded as one of the strongest mission propaganda organizations in the history of Protestant churches, was convened in Convention Hall this afternoon, with many distinguished clergymen and religious workers and hundreds of delegates from all over the United States and Canada present. All the large colleges and universities and Y. M. C. A. Institutes are represented.

There have been five similar conventions in previous years, and the great growth in attendance is evidence of the widespread interest aroused among the undergraduate body.

The special features of the convention will be the addresses by some of the leading modern missionaries; the discussion of different phases of Christian work—industrial and educational, as well as evangelical and medical; personal conference with men fresh from the mission fields of the world who will be available for interviews regarding the work and the opportunities in every land. An exhibit of practical nature, covering books and periodicals dealing with the work, will also be held. All delegates are to be entertained in the homes of citizens of Rochester.

RETIRE FROM SERVICE

Washington, Dec. 29.—After service of forty years in the cavalry branch of the army, Brigadier-General Winfield S. Edgerly was today placed on the retired list. His most recent active posts were as commander of the Department of Dakota and head of the Mounted Service School at Fort Riley, Kan. Two or three months ago General Edgerly was examined at his own request and pronounced physically unable to continue his duties. He is a native of New Hampshire and was graduated from West Point in 1870.

PREBLE WOULD FLY FROM PORTLAND TO CITY OF ANGELS

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 28.—In a communication received today by the committee in charge of the events of aviation week—January 10 to 20—in this city, E. P. Preble of Portland, Or., makes a novel offer.

To demonstrate the success of a new airship, which has been constructed on the lines of his own invention, Preble guarantees to fly from Portland to Los Angeles in time to take part in the aviation events. Any financial considerations involved are to be based upon the success of the undertaking.

The Preble airship is a cigar-shaped, affair, built something on the model of the Keppell, but its constructor contends it is far superior to the German craft. Preble asserts he will maintain an average speed of at least 40 miles an hour down the coast. His offer has been taken under consideration by the aviation committee of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association.

(Preble is well-known in Eugene, having been manager of the Frakes store in this city.)

START ORGANIZATION OF NATIVE SONS

Salem, Or., Dec. 28.—An effort is quietly being made to form an organization to be known as "The Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers."

The movement has so far advanced as to have the date for final organization set for tomorrow, when it is understood many prominent men of the state will assemble in this city to complete an organization which its promoters are assured will go. Any person of reputable character having ancestors in this Oregon country prior to the admission of the state to the Union is eligible.

PASSENGERS SPEND NIGHT OF TERROR

Bridgeport, O., Dec. 28.—Sixty passengers, 35 of them women, spent a night of terror aboard the ferryboat Charon, from Bellaire, O., to Benwood, W. Va., which became caught in an ice gorge in the Ohio River at 8 o'clock last night and floundered around until 5 a. m. today. All were landed in small boats at daylight without injury.

DESPERATE BATTLE BETWEEN HOUSE RAT AND RATTLESNAKE AND RATTLESNAKE

Rat Is Finally Victorious Over Its Poisonous Adversary

New York, Dec. 29.—A common house rat fought 13 rounds with a rattlesnake with 13 rattles in a barn on the farm of Edward Hawkins, near Bayonne. It killed the rattler in the last round by getting a strangle hold on it and retaining it until the reptile lay dead.

Twelve times the snake coiled, sprung its rattle and struck at the rat. Each time the little animal dodged and saved itself. The rattler was coiled for the 13th stroke when the rat dashed in and sank its long, sharp teeth into the snake's neck until they reached and thrashed wildly about the place in its efforts to free itself. The rat suffered terrible punishment while that thrashing was going on. Not for an instant, however, did it loosen its grip. It seemed to know that to do so would spell death for it, and it was not ready to die. When finally the rat had finished its poisonous foe it let go its hold, backed off and seemed well satisfied with what it had done.

The fight was not due to accident. It was set up Hawkins, a truck farmer, and his brother Joseph. They watched it from the start to finish, and after the rat had won, they asserted they would match the victor against all comers in the rat or snake line. Joseph is a farmer in Sussex county, N. J. He took the rattlesnake to Bayonne in a suitcase, after he had captured it in his chicken house, and narrowly escaped being bitten.

Edward Hawkins had caught a large rat in a barrel trap. He suggested that the snake and rat be permitted to fight till death. The men thought the rattler would make short work of the rat and swallow it. In the Hawkins barn there is a small drying room, which has no crevices in the walls or floors. The rat and rattler were turned loose in that room and the two Hawkins watched them from the trapdoor above. When the rat had circled about the room and discovered there was no way it could escape, it dashed at the snake whenever it was uncoiled. The rattler rattled and the rat squeaked violently. The fight raged all over the room until finally the rat got the hold that strangled the snake with the unlucky thirteen rattles.
