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FOOTBALL RULES

TO BE REVISED

Intercollegiate Association Resolves to Take Action

New York, Dec. 28.—The Intercollegiate Athletic Association adopted and submitted to the rules committee tonight a resolution calling for a modification of the football playing rules to reduce injury to contestants to a minimum.

The resolution, introduced by Professor E. K. Hall, of Dartmouth, and adopted after three hours of acrimonious discussion, follows:

"That the football rules committee of this association be instructed to use every possible endeavor to bring about such a modification of the rules as in its judgment shall tend to reduce to a minimum the danger of physical injury to players and at the same time retain as far as possible the most desirable and wholesome features of the game."

Negative Votes Three.
Only three votes were registered against the resolution, but nearly every college in the West had something to say concerning it.

Professor Alonzo A. Stagg, of the University of Chicago, made a motion that would prohibit all officials of a football game, including umpires, referees and participants from talking to newspapermen after the game. Stagg made a strong appeal for this motion, saying he had been grossly misquoted at times. The convention defeated the motion by an overwhelming vote.

The revision of the game was ordered. It is understood, with due consideration of Yale, Princeton, Pennsylvania and Cornell of the association and a few other institutions that are not members of the intercollegiate organization, Harvard has joined the association, but its representative let it be known that his institution would not be bound by the football rules of the association, although it would recognize its regulation of other minor sports.

A letter was read from David Starr Jordan, president of the Leland Stanford University, asserting that the American game had been abandoned there and that the English Rugby game had been found satisfactory, not only to the students, but to the spectators.

West Point submitted a resolution which called for a radical change in the playing rules, but this, with other resolutions, was substituted by the resolution offered by Mr. Hall of Dartmouth.

It became apparent that the larger colleges were in favor of the present playing rules, perhaps in modified form, and that smaller institutions were violently opposed to them. The representative of nearly every institution of higher learning between New York and San Francisco made an address and many offered motions that would limit the danger of the present football game. These offerings became so confused that Hall's resolution was adopted as a compromise.

O. A. C. MAY LOSE

DIRECTOR ANGELL

Madison, Wis., Dec. 28.—Dave Angell, formerly basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin, now director of athletics at the Oregon Agricultural college, is the latest suggestion for the vacancy in the directorship of Wisconsin athletics.

Director Hutchins resigned a few days ago to go to the Bitter Root irrigation project, but his real reason was faculty opposition to intercollegiate athletics. Angell may be opposed because when he was at Wisconsin, the Badger institution was enthusiastic over athletics and the new regime is not friendly to the men of the old order of athletics.

MULTNOMAH WILL

NOT PLAY ALL STARS

There will be no New Year's day football game of the intercollegiate kind on New Year's day on Multnomah field. The club eleven has made a good showing this season, and financially football has been a success. The Seattle All-Stars comprised some of the best football players in the country and Manager McMillan is sorry to lose the chance of this game. The Multnomah soccer team will probably use the grounds on the holiday date.—Oregonian.
