Portland, Dec. 30.—If Portland has a team in the Northwestern League during the coming season, such a team will have to be financed by D. E. DOING IN B. C.?

Is the University of Oregon planning to spring something new on the other colleges of the Northwest when the next conference meeting is held, probably within the next few months? If not, why is Trainer Bill Hayward attending the Rugby football games in British Columbia now

between the University of California and the Vancouver, B. C., team?

In the present agitation for reformed football, the example of California and Stanford playing a new game which gives all the exercise and yields less serious injuries may be expected to get the other colleges of this section to thinking. Yet when the matter was proposed to President Campbell, of the University of Oregon, he took a firm stand for American football.

However that may be, Hayward is in British Columbia viewing the games. He told the people up there that he thinks the reforms made in American football will satisfy for a year or two, but that perhaps Rugby will eventually be the game in vogue. —Telegram.

BOWLS TWENTY-TWO

STRIKES IN SUCCESSION

Denver, Dec. 29.—Ira Belden, an outfielder of the Denver Western League baseball team, last night bowled 22 strikes in succession, making a perfect score of 300 in one game and 230 in another. In the first game Belden scored 220, making a total of 800 pins, or an average of 266 2-3 pins. Belden's score, which is a record for the Rocky Mountain region, was made in a private game.

NEW POSTAL CARD

BEING ISSUED TODAY

Likely They Will Be Put on Sale at Many Postoffices on New Year's Day

Washington, Dec. 30.—Distribution was commenced today of the new design of postal cards, and it is likely that they will be put on sale in many postoffices New Year's Day.

While the new card bears a head of McKinley, a better likeness of the late president has been secured and the border design has been improved.

On the new small card intended for index purposes and for social correspondence, the head of Lincoln will appear. The two-cent international post card will bear a portrait of General Grant.

The double or reply card will contain a new feature. On the original message half will appear a likeness of Gen. Washington and the stamp on the reply half will contain a picture of Martha Washington.

Postoffice department officials say that the borders of the stamps on all the different cards will present an attractive diversity of design.

On all the cards the words "Postal Card", required by the Universal Postal Union Convention, will appear in the border of the stamp instead of a separate inscription.

BURBANK LIKES

DOLLAR TOO WELL

Carnegie Institute to Withdraw Support Because of Alleged Commercialism

San Francisco, Dec. 29.—Commercialism, alleged to have been displayed by Luther Burbank in his experiments, was given today as the reason for the reported withdrawal of the Carnegie institute's financial support of the plant wizard. Word was received here yesterday that the trustees of the institute, who recently met in New York, had decided to cut Burbank off from its benefactions, charging that his creations were being exploited for commercial purposes.

It was announced recently that Herbert Law and his brother, Harland Law, had formed a corporation to handle Burbank's products, and it was reported that this was the argument used against the continuance of the \$10,000 annuity which the institute had awarded Burbank.

At his Santa Rosa home Burbank declared he had heard nothing whatever of the matter, and added that he had been informed that Carnegie's support would be continued.
