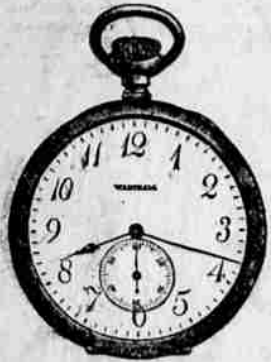

NEW YEAR IS WELCOMED BY NOISE AND MIRTH

Confetti Blizzard in Gotham
Tears Last Leaf from
the Calendar

New York, Jan. 1.—With hearts as light as the confetti that swirled blizzard-like about the Broadway revel route, New Yorkers tore the last leaf from the calendar of 1909 and set their faces toward the New Year.

Of all the boisterous New Year's eves, there never was one more noisy and hilarious. Early yesterday the word was sent out from Police Commissioner Baker's office:

"Let the crowds have a good time. Suppress rowdiness, but allow them to make a noise."

The celebration cost New Yorkers about three quarters of a million dollars.

Nowhere in New York City at midnight on New Year's eve is there a busier throng of hurrying humanity than at the junction of Park Row and the Bowery. Intermingled with the throng are merry panhandlers, as happy as the richest, for New Year's eve is their harvest time.

Few of the panhandlers who frequent the downtown districts ply their vocation as old Trinity tells out the midnight hour in the chimneys. The belated ones hurry to a dive at Chatham square, there to meet brother mendicants and joyously celebrate with the money begged from New Year shoppers.

Here one may witness nightly transformations more wonderful than in the famous "Court of Miracles" in old Paris which Victor Hugo describes in "Notre Dame." The blind see, the dumb talk, the hunchback loses all traces of his deformity, the deaf hear; missing limbs are grown in a twinkling, and the lame discard their crutches and dance in glee.

Of all the nights in the year the gladdest in this dive in the Bowery is New Year's eve. Not until long after the late dawn does the drunken revelry cease, and then only when the merry-makers have spent all of their ill gotten gains and are unconscious to their surroundings.

Clergymen of New York and representative women today denounced the disgraceful orgies that marked the public celebration of New Year's eve. Rev. Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst declared that he intended to write a letter of protest to the "Mayor."

There were other indications of a concerted movement to prevent a recurrence of such scenes as were witnessed last night.

JOY UNCONFINED IN WINDY CITY

Chicago, Jan. 1.—Chicago restaurants and cafes were filled last night as they probably never have been before on a similar occasion, with dinner parties bent upon bidding appropriate farewell to the old year and welcome to the new.

In all of the fashionable downtown restaurants nearly every table had been reserved in advance, and the luckless transients who dropped in at the height of the revelry had poor shift.

The streets presented a carnival appearance. A continuous flow of merry revelers moved in compact streams in opposite directions, nearly every component individual contributing in some manner to the general din of horns, bells racket-creating devices of every description.

Everybody was bombarded with confetti, but nobody cared, for everybody was on his good behavior.

MUMMER'S PAGEANT IN PHILADELPHIA

Philadelphia, Jan. 1.—King Mimus, sovereign of merry-makers, after a reign of twenty-four hours, tonight abdicated his temporary throne in Philadelphia and passed into retirement for a year. He was the king of a day, and like all energetic rulers, labored to make the length of his rule show results. While he sojourneyed on the throne of revelry he overturned the existing order of things and left the city upside down.

Staid old Philadelphians turned out to do him honor. Business and professional men forgot their dignity. And among the more active workers in the cause of his majesty the mummy king was exalted and for the time in complete control.

It is estimated that nearly a half million persons in Philadelphia today braved the cold to look at the great pageant in honor of his highness.
