SPRINGFIELD COMMERCIAL PLANS ACTIVE YEAR OF PROMOTION WORK

Matters Planned at Meeting Last Night—To Light Main Street

The meeting of the Commercial club last evening, was the first held since the election of new officers and the club has a very favorable indication of a successful year. Many matters were brought up, and the club has decided to make a series of improvements in the city, and to see that the club is the cause of the city's improvement.

Better Road Up Willamette.
The Commercial club has decided to champion the cause of the residents on the Willamette above Natron in the hope of giving them a decent road. It seems as though the railroad when it took the county road, which was a good one, for its right of way promised to build another road that would be equally as good and have no greater grades in it. The road that it has built is exceedingly poor and has excessive grades in it. It is said that the local road supervisors refused to accept it but that the county road with apparent indifference did accept it. The matter will be brought up with Eugene for aid. It is said that it requires six horses to haul 1500 pounds and that two horses can hardly pull a light buggy over it. It is especially bad near Jasper. The committee consists of Peery, Barr and Russell.

The report of the joint action of the committees of the Eugene and Springfield clubs in regard to placing a steel trestle over the road on Mill street was heard and ratified. At this meeting several new members were introduced and speeches heard from Messrs. Hurd and Greenleaf of the new real estate firm.

WHAT THE CENSUS TAKER WILL ASK YOU

He Will Ask You Just Thirty-two Questions Which Must Be Answered

The census enumerator when he goes his rounds in April, will be required to ask thirty-two questions and they are classified under thirteen groups as follows:

Name of each person whose place of abode on April 15, 1910, was in his family.

Personal description—Sex to the race; age last birthday; whether single, married, widowed or divorced; number of years of present marriage; mother of how many children, number born, number living.

Nativity—Place of birth of this person; place of birth of father; place of birth of mother. If born in the United States, give the state or territory. If of foreign birth, give the country.

Citizenship—Year of immigration to the United States; whether naturalized or alien.

Whether able to speak English; or if not, give the language spoken.

Occupation—Trade or profession of or particular kind of work done by this person, as spinner, salesman, laborer, etc.; general nature of industry, business or establishment in which this person works, as cotton mill, dry goods store, farm, etc.; whether an employee or working on own account. If an employee, whether out of work on April 15, 1910; number of weeks out of work during the year 1909.

Education—Whether able to read; whether able to write; attended school any time since September 1, 1909.

Ownership of home—Owned or rented; owned free or mortgaged; farm or home; number of farm schedule.

Whether a survivor of the union confederate army or navy.

Whether blind—both eyes.

Whether deaf and dumb.

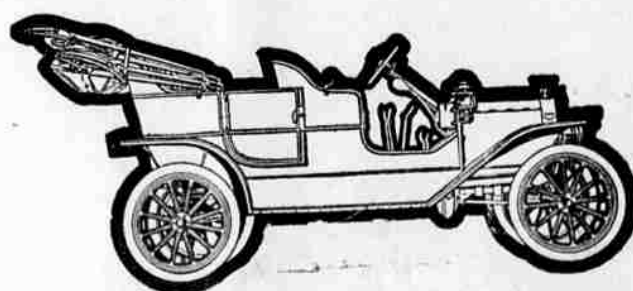
