ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF ASSAULT WITH DANGEROUS WEAPON

Sinslaw Man Is in Trouble—Other Lower Valley Notes

A warrant was issued in Justice Severy's court a few days ago on complaint of A. W. Stonefield, for the arrest of Harry Bray, son of Ira Bray, of Heeceta, on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Walter Haring, as constable, went out to Heeceta and placed the young man under arrest and brought him to Florence Saturday afternoon.

The case was set for hearing before Judge Severy Monday morning. At that time a change of venue was secured and the case transferred to the justice court in Heeceta precinct. Bray was released from custody on giving bonds for \$25.00 to appear at the trial.

It seems that the parties had some difficulty, which culminated in a rock being thrown by Bray and striking Stonefield on the back of the head.

A physician was called to Heeceta on Monday to attend to Stonefield, who did not come to Florence for the trial.

Death of Mrs. Brogan.
At Blisbee, Arizona, on December 13, 1909, Mrs. Myrtle Brogan, aged 33 years, 5 months and 10 days. She was formerly Miss Myrtle Young, and was brought up near Mapleton. She left a husband and four children, the eldest being ten years old, and the youngest born only a few hours before its mother's death.
