NEW RATE FOR CITY WATER CONSUMERS.

Council Passed New Ordinance
in Regular Meeting
Last Night

The city council has adopted a new schedule for water rates, an ordinance fixing the rates having been passed at the regular meeting last night, new schedule going into effect on and after January 1, 1910.

There has been no just classification of water rates in the city of Eugene, and in many instances the price fixed was arbitrary and not based upon service rendered. The new schedule will tend to regulate and equalize the rate. The new rate will not effect the small user in any material way, the dwelling rate averaging \$1.00 per month as formerly, the rate being 50c for faucet, 25c for bath and 25c for toilet. The large users will be more particularly affected.

A booklet containing rates, rules and regulations will be published and distributed to water users.

Temporary Tabernacle.
Rev. H. N. Mount appeared before the council in behalf of the Eugene Ministerial association, presenting a petition for a building permit for the erection of a tabernacle which will entirely cover the lot on the southwest corner of 6th and Willamette streets, belonging to F. L. Chambers and Al Hampton, the building to be a wooden shell structure with a seating capacity of 3,000. A special ordinance was passed granting this permit, making provision that the building be maintained for a period of 60 days and removed at the end of this time.

Minor Matters.
Two Fairmount ministers presented petitions for arch lights at their respective churches, one at the corner of 17th street and Columbia Avenue, where the Christian church is located and one at 15th street and Villard avenue by the Presbyterian church. The petition was granted, providing the churches stand the city's expense of installation.

Councilman Williams reported that property owners in the neighborhood of Franklin street at the mill race crossing had raised money by private subscription for raising the street grade and petitioned the city to have this work done. The matter was referred to the city engineer.

Melvin Hansen's petition for cross walk at 2nd and Blair streets was granted and the work ordered done. Free Thomas appeared and asked that the council take some action upon the matter of the warrant for \$300 issued to him as an advance payment for flume lumber for the city power plant, and which the mayor had refused to sign.

Mayor Matlock explained that he had refused to sign the warrant on the ground that it was not regular and not safe to advance the money in this manner, taking a private person's bond as security. The council has no power to act further upon the matter.

Mr. Thomas' only recourse is a writ of mandamus.

Mr. Morris, superintendent of construction on the city's transmission pole line, reported poles delivered to the amount of 3,000 and cross arms to the amount of \$400 and asked for a payment of \$300 be made on the contract. Ordered paid.

Chairman Garrett of the fire and water committee reported favorably on bills for material used in the construction of the city's power plant and transmission line. Bills were ordered paid as follows: cross arms, \$300; Chambers & Co., \$93, both on account of Morris Bros. contract. John A. Rosenthal Sons, for hard drawn copper wire, \$255.71.

Bill of Westinghouse Electric Co. for electrical machinery for power house to the amount of \$7900, was reported, 50 per cent to be paid upon receipt of bill of lading.

Additional hose for the fire department was reported ordered. The Fairmount hose house was reported completed and bill to the bill, amounting to \$37, was ordered paid.

George J. Irvin's bill of \$27.77 for bridge construction across the power plant ditch was ordered paid.

Councilman Garrett reported that the farmer's telephone companies east of Springfield along the right of way of the transmission pole line had consented and agreed to move their pole line to one side of the county road alongside with the Pacific Telephone Co.'s pole line, and would pay \$15 toward the expense, the city paying the balance.

The mayor reported having ordered some sub-station equipment for the power plant. The council ratified the action.

Street committee reported 10,000 feet of new lumber and 3,000 feet of lumber used in construction of cross walk the past month.

W. L. Kincaid was granted permission to remove trees on Olive street in front of his property.

Councilman Moon of the finance committee reported the regular monthly bills which were ordered paid. An adjustment was made in the salaries of the different city employees, warrants being ordered for their payment in full to January 1. Hereafter all salaries are to be paid on the first of each month, giving city employees a common pay day.

Chairman Williams of the health committee reported inspections having been made of the butcher shops, hotels and restaurants and found conditions favorable.

Petitions for sewer in the alley between 6th and 7th streets from Monrovia to Harrison were referred to the city engineer and the sewer committee.

Ordinance regulating water rent

als, rules and regulations was acted upon before stated, and fire and water committee ordered to have pamphlets printed and issued containing full information to water users.

Plat of Wallis-Dorris addition to Eugene on West 10th street was approved. The city attorney was instructed to take steps to condemn property for the opening of 10th street between the James Huddleston and Wallis-Dorris additions; also of Van Buren street from 7th to 8th. The application of City Attorney Pipes for a 30 days' leave of absence was granted and Attorney G. F. Skippworth was appointed to act in his place during his absence.
