LOUIS PAULHAN  
SOARS TO HEIGHT  
OF 4600 FEET

Aviation Camp, Los Angeles, Jan. 12.—Louis Paulhan, the French aviator, broke all official and unofficial records for altitude today in a Farman biplane. It is estimated he rose to a height of 4000 feet.

As methods of measurement are not exact, this may be questioned, but it is certain that he exceeded Hubert Latham's record made at Mourmelon, France, December 1, 1909, by at least 1000 feet. Latham's record was given at between 1600 and 1800 feet.

The instrument on Paulhan's machine made his greatest height 4600 feet. The judges' record of Paulhan's altitude, which has still to be sanctioned officially, was 1524 meters, approximately 5000 feet. The time in air was 59 minutes, 46 1-5 seconds. The time of descent was 7 minutes, 39 seconds.

Paulhan made his great record soon after losing the speed record of the course to Glenn H. Curtiss.

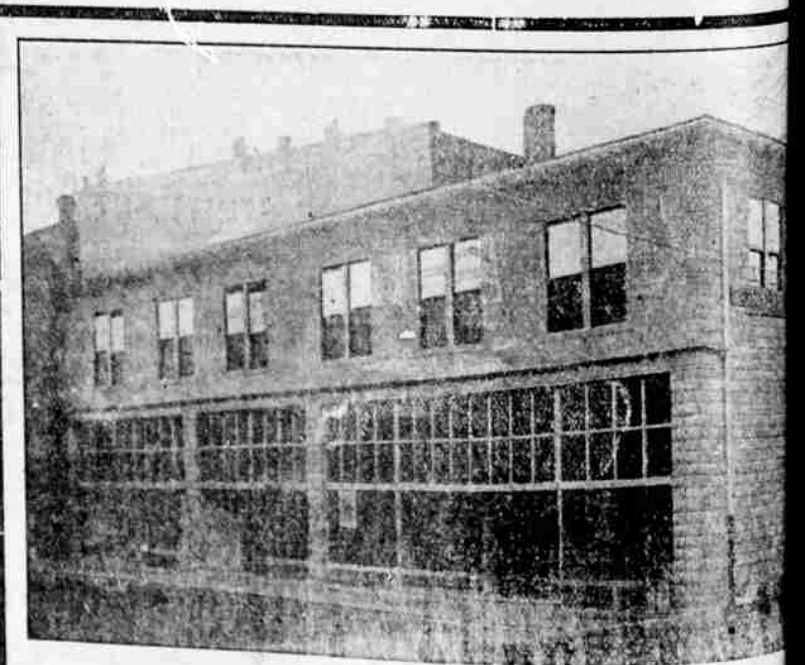
