ABERDEEN WILL RETALIATE ON SEATTLE

Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 19.—Because Aberdeen was dropped from the Northwestern Baseball league, business men of this city began today an extensive boycott of Seattle wholesale dealers and jobbers. The action in dropping Aberdeen is held solely at the door of D. E. Dugdale, owner of the Seattle club, who, it is declared, has an agreement with Congressman W. W. McCredie, former owner of the Portland franchise and the Northwestern league, to be reduced to four teams, preparatory to union with the Coast league. It is believed now that the Coast league of eight teams may be perfected for the coming season.

Business men here today sent out scores of telegrams to their Seattle dealers, informing them that unless Aberdeen were restored at once to a place in the league, all Aberdeen business would be diverted to Portland.

EUGENE AND ALBANY TO PLAY BASKET BALL

Says the Albany Herald: The third game of the High school basketball league will be played here next Friday night when Albany High will meet Eugene at the Alico gym. This is expected by the Albany team to be one of the hardest games of the season, as the Eugene boys have not played any games so far excepting a few locals, devoting their entire time to a careful round of coaching.

The local team is in good condition with the exception of Stalnaker who is still suffering from a sprained ankle received at the Corvallis game. The splendid work of Coach Bilyeu is beginning to show in the team work and basket shooting. Line-up for Albany will be forwards, Stalnaker, Dooley; center Engstrom; guards, Bighes and Carnegie; sub., Ebertine and Benson.

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Cuts Out Horse Race
North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 19.—Horse racing is to be cut out of the State Fair programme, if Dr. J. S. Kloeber, president of the State Fair board, is correctly quoted in his address to the state horticultural society at Wenatchee. Dr. Kloeber is reported to have said, "In the future we expect to cut out the bar, the racetrack and the gambling interests, and to make it primarily an institution of exploitation." Local horsemen are hoping that there is some mistake.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 19.—Roseburg High school defeated Klamath Falls High school at basketball in this city last night, 16 to 15. At the end of the first half the score stood 8 to 7 in favor of the visitors. The lineup—Roseburg—Blakeley and Eddy; forwards, Street, center, Tipton and Buchanan, guards, Klamath Falls—Du Fault and Notschenbacher, forwards; Barnes, center; Jacobson and Fouch, guards.
