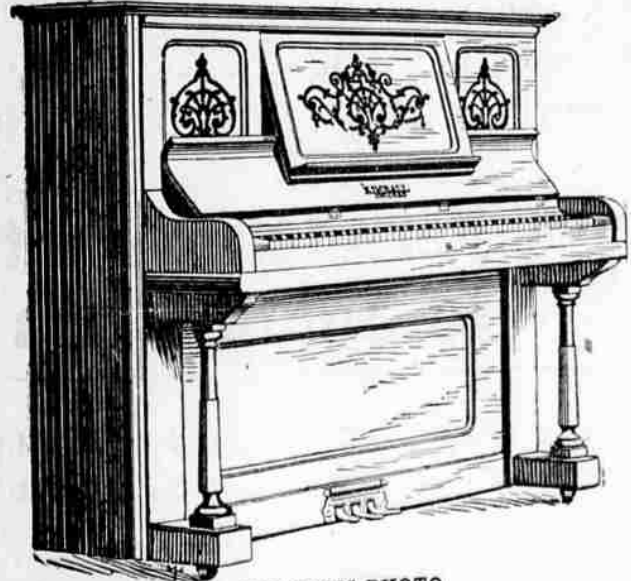

COMMISSIONER BAILEY'S SIDE OF STOCK STORY

Says He Sent Word to Keepers Of His Ranch to Supply Hay

State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey, when shown a dispatch from Eugene to the Portland Telegram yesterday that the Eugene Humane society had taken steps to prosecute him for alleged neglect of his cattle on his ranch in the McKenzie valley, said:

"I got caught out there in the McKenzie valley, like many other farmers have this year. How could I forecast this abnormal weather condition any better than other farmers, who have been caught by the dozen, just as I was? Does anyone think that I would turn out to starve from sheer cussedness, a band of stock that has cost me a big sum of hard-earned money? I have done and will continue to do all that I can to save the animals."

The Journal says: State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey, in a statement made regarding the foregoing news dispatch, says that he had not heard of the trouble when received word that they were without feed. He at once, on Sunday, sent feed to them and again ordered more to be sent yesterday.

Mr. Bailey said that he formerly had 150 head of cattle and 50 sheep on the ranch, but that some time ago he sent a carload away, and that he did not know that he had more than 40 or 50 head there at the present time. At the time he took the carload away he was told by those in charge of his place that he had feed sufficient for the winter and was advised to leave the remainder there, which he did.

The snow and the ice of the recent cold spell was hard on his cattle, Mr. Bailey says, and it was impossible to get feed to them on account of the high water and the slippery roads. Some time ago Hart Brothers, who are in charge of the place, sent him word that some of the cattle were getting pretty thin and asked for authority to sell the thin ones. He gave the authority.

Mr. Bailey says that the same conditions have been existent in eastern Oregon and that the sheep and cattle have been dying in large numbers, so that it is nothing unusual for his cattle to be in the same fix. He is trying to get feed to them, and did not know that they needed it until Sunday, and cannot see why Hart Brothers did not inform him sooner of the bad conditions.
