APPLICATION FOR LIGHT FRANCHISE MADE TO FLORENCE COUNCIL

T. J. Munroe Would Install
Plant in Lower Sius-
law City

A special meeting of the Florence board of trustees was held Monday evening, at which an application for a franchise for an electric light and power plant was presented by T. J. Munroe. With the application was an ordinance, similar to that in force at North Bend, which would grant the franchise asked for, and fixes the prices to be charged for arc lights, 16 and 32 candle power lights, and which if adopted, would virtually constitute a contract between the town and the owners of the plant. The authority to grant such a franchise is not vested in the council, as the provisions of the charter requires that the question must be submitted to a vote of the tax payers.

Mr. Munroe does not ask for an exclusive franchise and the ordinance provides that he or his successors must have the plant completed and ready to furnish power during day, within twelve months after contract is accepted, otherwise the franchise may be declared forfeited. The time named is twenty-five years for which the franchise is to run. The prices mentioned in the application do not seem very high and, in fact, are said to be considerably lower than is charged in some other place.—West.
