and more will be filed every day.

enter her name may write to the

once be placed in the free subscrip-
tion list to receive the paper at her
house every day until the close of
the contest and will be furnished
with receipt blanks and other in-
formation to assist her in securing
votes.

The standing of the contestants as
presented today show a decided gain
in the standing of a number of girls
who were down the list in Monday's
paper. Many that were near the
bottom of the list have forged very
near the top of the column.

There is still time for any girl in
the list to start in and get to the top
