staying quality. Those who have en-
tered the contest with the determina-
tion of staying with it to the end are
going to come out victorious.

This may not occur to you, but
even if one aspirant does get a few
thousand votes in the lead of her
competitors in a certain district it
must not be taken for granted that
the race is won, and perhaps the
young ladies who are apparently re-
posing in quiet near the bottom will
be the ones to creep unawares and
carry off the prize. Such things have
been done and many a race has been
lost by over-confidence. Don't let
rumor influence you one way or the
other. It is often the case that a
candidate or her friends will hear
that such a one has secured a few
years' subscriptions. These rumors
usually are false, as the secrets of
this office are not aired to inquir-
ers, and the reports started in hopes
that the other young ladies of the
district will become discouraged and
stop their efforts. Such rumors
should only be the goad to better
things.

Pitch right in with the determina-

mail subscriptions taken at the \$3
rate, in fact, all subscriptions.
