COUNTY COURT TO START ERA OF ROAD BUILDING

This Spring Will See Great Ac-
tivity in That Line—New
Roller and Crusher

County Judge Thompson says that
as soon as the county's new ten-ton
gasoline road roller and new rock
crusher arrive and as soon as spring
weather opens up, the county court
will inaugurate an era of good road
building that has never before been
attempted in this county. A system-
atic effort will be put forth to place
the roads of the county in a better
condition than they ever were in the
history of this part of the state, and
by properly directed efforts this can
be accomplished.

The stretch of road between the
Willamette river bridge and the
slough north of Eugene, which has re-
cently been completed, is a sample
of the work to be done in the future.
This road was built with crushed
rock and rolled, making a highway
that will stand the wear and tear of
the extensive travel over it for years
to come.

Eugene-Springfield Boulevard
The matter of a macadamized bou-
levard between Eugene and Spring-
field will receive immediate attention
from the county court. Work on the
thoroughfare will begin as soon as
possible. The county will make the
improvement from the eastern limits
of Eugene at Judkins' Point to the
river bridge at Springfield, and the
city council of Eugene will doubtless
do its part toward improving East
Eleventh street in Fairmount. This
is said to be the worst part of the
whole road. There are deep ruts in
the street nearly the entire distance
from the end of the pavement at the
University to the city limits. Such a
street as recently built on Emerald
avenue in Fairmount will last for
years on East Eleventh street despite
the fact that this thoroughfare has
more travel than any other road in
the county.

EUGENE TO COOS. SAYS MR. HOLMES

Mr. Arthur Holmes, a salesman
for the Armour Company, made his
regular call on the trade here this
week. He is an enthusiastic booster
for the state, and is especially in-
terested in the growth of Coos Bay.
He informs us that there are at pre-
sent nearly 2000 men, and a great
many teams, steam shovels and
drills at work on the extension of
the road to Klamath Falls. By Au-
gust there will have been completed
at least forty miles of road through
the most mountainous district east
of the coast range. The road is al-
so making a better showing and ac-
complishing more headway than any
railroad building ever before at-
tempted under the same existing
conditions. He firmly believes that
eventually the road will push its
line west from Eugene and tap the
Coos Bay country via Florence—
North Bend Harbor.

GYMNASIUM READY FOR USE BY NEXT SATURDAY EVENING

Hardwood Floor Finished and
Coat of Oil Spread—Exam-
inations Next Week

The laying of the big hardwood
floor in the new gymnasium at the
University was finished today and the
first coat of oil applied. By Satur-
day evening it will be ready for use.
The baskets will be put up at once
and practice will be held here after
this week. Bill Hayward today plac-
ed an order for the equipment after
thoroughly investigating several other
well-equipped gymnasiums on the
coast. There are over two hundred
items on the list.

The interior of the gymnasium
is being rapidly put in shape. The
painters are at work in the base-
ment after finishing most of the up-
stairs work. The cement floors in
the shower bath rooms have been
laid and only the facets have to be
placed that these may be used. The
lockers which will be steel with com-
bination locks, have been ordered,
but will not be here for several
weeks. The swimming tank will
probably not be ready for use until
the rest of the building is finished
as it is not so essential.

The indoor track has also been
left to the last as the covered track
and the cross country are enough
for this spring's training.

The remainder of the inter-class
basketball series will be finished
after examinations.
Examinations Wednesday
The examinations which begin
next Wednesday morning have been
arranged in the order of the hours
of the day. The eight o'clock classes
are on Wednesday, nine o'clock on
Thursday, and so on until the fol-
lowing Friday. School re-opens for
the second semester of Tuesday,
February 15.
