FREDERICK WARDE'S INTERPRETATION OF SHAKESPEARE'S SHYLOCK

Recital Given Last Night at the Presbyterian Church to a Large Audience

Shylock wasn't such a bad fellow, after all, according to Frederick Warde. Shylock was a persecuted Jew, spat upon and hounded as a dog, hated all the more because he was successful in money matters. He was scorned by the so-called Christians of the age, and at every turn made to feel their contempt. At a critical time in his life, Shylock was asked for a rather large loan, and even as the Christian gentlemen asked they flouted him. For security he asked the pound of flesh, and the Christian, filled with hate for the Jew and understanding the Jew's hatred of himself, agreed to the bargain. Antonio failed to return the money and in the courts the Jew demanded his pound of flesh. This trial came but a few days after Shylock's daughter had eloped with a Christian, the two taking much of his money and jewels, some of his most prized jewels. These crises came into his life when he was old, after years of insult at the hands of his victims and his friends. Naturally he was embittered to the utmost and obdurate in demanding that the borrower pay his bond as agreed upon. How Fortia saved her husband by admitting the justice of Shylock's claim, but warning him to take no drop of blood with his flesh, is not a part of this phase of the drama. It was natural that Shylock should feel as he did, and he demanded but his legal rights. It is Mr. Warde's opinion that had Shakespeare written his story today, rather than a couple of centuries ago, when his English friends and patrons had little use for the Jew, he would have made out even a better case for Shylock.

Mr. Warde's reading of "The Merchant of Venice" at the Presbyterian church last night was immensely pleasing to a large audience.

Mr. Warde's effort last night was to make his characters present-day humans rather than creations of Shakespearean literature and his own interpretations accomplished this feat very satisfactorily. He read Fortia's lines with such pleasing intonation that one fell in love not only with her character, but with her charming personality. At all times the audience

MILITIA NOW ON FOOTING WITH ARMY

Washington, Jan. 28.—The famous "Dick Law," which nationalizes, so to speak, the militia organizations of the various states by placing them upon the same footing as the regular army and making them a national military organization subsidiary to the regular army in case of war, has gone into effect. This law, framed by United States Senator General Charles Dick, of Ohio, was originally passed by congress in 1903 and was intended to become operative at once. It was readily seen, however, that the states could not change their systems so soon, and that much time would be needed for the reorganization. Then it was decided that the law should go into effect in 1908, but when the five years had elapsed it was found that even then several of the states, among them Pennsylvania and Delaware, were not quite ready for the change and the time was once more extended to January 21, 1910.

HARRIMAN FORTUNE GOES INTO REALTY

New York, Jan. 28.—The millions left by E. H. Harriman are to be withdrawn gradually from Wall Street, according to a statement published here today, and will be invested to a large extent in high-class Manhattan realty. Mrs. Harriman's advisers claim, it is said, that without the hand of Mr. Harriman to guide and guard her interests in stocks there might easily be manipulation which would cause a large loss to the estate and might have a far-reaching effect on the financial interests of the country.

WALKER STATION COUPLE HAVE BEEN MARRIED 55 YEARS

Will Celebrate Anniversary on February 1—Are Early Oregon Pioneers

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 28.—Mr. and Mrs. John Walker, early settlers of Oregon, will celebrate their fifty-fifth wedding anniversary February 1. Mr. Walker crossed the plains with a mule team in quest of gold, prospecting for three years in Nevada, California and Jackson county, Southern Oregon, but not finding gold in paying quantities, decided to till the soil for his future vocation. Coming to this section, he took up a donation claim four miles east of here, where he lived 16 years, going from here to Walker Station, his present home. During the second year of his residence on his homestead he was married to Miss Jane Christman, the daughter of Campbell Christman, then the wealthiest man in Lane county.

During the early part of 1853, while prospecting in Southern Oregon, Mr. Walker was obliged to exist for six weeks on beef without bread on account of a heavy snowstorm. As soon as the roads were passable he went to Jacksonville, and to his dismay found that they were out of flour there. When the first pack train reached that place the people were on the verge of desperation for breadstuffs. The citizens and miners quickly purchased the packer's stock of flour at \$1 per pound. The flour, however, was closely guarded and equally distributed. After leaving Jacksonville, coming north, he was unable to procure more flour until he met Hugh Field's pack train in the Umpqua valley, and paid \$1 per pound there, but the flour was so poor, being made from smutty wheat, it made him sick.

From his donation claim he hauled his bacon by ox team to Portland, taking two weeks to make the trip, purchasing provisions and clothing enough to last the family one year, also purchasing his flour at Crawfordville, Lin county, paying \$16 per hundred for it, and afterward exchanging their wheat for flour at Cloverdale.

While living on his homestead he went into the fishing business with Halo Tish, chief of the Calapooia Indian tribe. They constructed a crude fish trap on Row river. Mr. Walker would take the catch one day and Halo Tish would take the next, but Halo Tish would take all the eels, which were a favorite food with his tribe. The Indians at that time were friendly, and when Mr. Walker was too busy to go to the trap Halo would take Mr. Walker's share of the fish to him. Walker Station was named after these old pioneers after the railroad was built through this section.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker have five grown children living: Mrs. N. B. Walden, Minnesota; Mrs. Martha Wiseman, Weiser, Idaho; J. W. Walker, Waldport, Or.; Ewing and George, at Walker, Or. Mr. Walker is quite wealthy.

SAWMILL AT LATHAM IS SOLD

Cottage Grove, Jan. 26.—The saw mill belonging to A. L. Woodard, located at Latham, was leased yesterday to J. H. Chambers. Involving the entire plant and lumber in the yards was started, and as soon as completed Mr. Chambers will assume the management. He is a practical sawmill man, with years of experience. The plant is one mile south of here, on the west bank of the Coast Fork river. The logs are cut and flumed down this to the docks, leading from the main line to the Southern Pacific railroad. This is one of the most unique little mills in the country.
