"WHITE SLAVERY"

The country is becoming thoroughly aroused over the exposures brought to bear upon the heinous "white slave" traffic in this nation. The horrors of intemperance pale into insignificance compared with this traffic in the bodies and souls of girls. Innocent, unsophisticated country girls are lured to large cities under promise of light work and good wages, and various other pretenses, and when once there they are cast into houses of prostitution from which escape is virtually impossible, and there their young lives are wrecked. They cannot escape, they are constantly watched, they are not permitted to have clothing in which they could appear on the streets even if they would escape, and worse, they are compelled to write home to their parents—if they have any—telling them they have employment and are doing well, even sending small amounts of money home to the family. Yet they are as virtually and literally slaves, "white slaves," as were ever the blacks of the South. The states are becoming alive to this horrible iniquity. Several states have passed the most stringent laws bearing upon the subject, and there will be no cessation of efforts to wipe out this foul crime until every state in the union has passed laws making any demon, male or female—they do not deserve the name of man or woman—who engages in the traffic of luring girls to destruction, outcasts and outlaws before society and the law. Every father and mother should certainly be interested in the suppression of this monstrous evil in our land.

SUES PATTISON ESTATE FOR RUNNING FARM

J. R. Pattison Seeks to Recover
Over \$6000 From Estate
of Robt. Pattison

J. R. Pattison today began suit in the circuit court against S. B. Eakin and William T. Pattison, executors of the estate of Robert Pattison, who died at his home near Eugene on January 7, 1909, leaving an estate valued at \$30,000, to recover over \$6000, alleged due him for superintending the farm of the deceased from February 16, 1909, to the date of his death. The plaintiff alleged that on that date he entered into a contract with Robert Pattison to superintend the farm. The plaintiff says \$700 a year is a reasonable compensation and claims that \$6133.75 is due him, some money having been paid him. F. H. Greenman and H. E. Slattery are attorneys for the plaintiff.

A committee from the district fair association was before the county commissioners' court this afternoon presenting their claims for an appropriation of \$1000 for the fair. The matter has been taken under advisement.

All over 18 years of age who have signed applications for charter membership in the Y. M. C. A. are earnestly requested to be present at the Methodist church at 7:30 sharp tonight to perfect the permanent organization of the association. At that time constitution and by-laws will be adopted and a board of directors of 15 elected.

The Board of Higher Curricula, created at the last session of the state legislature, will hold a week's session early next month, coming to Eugene and going to Corvallis and Portland. State Senator J. E. Hedges, of Oregon City, secretary of the board, will leave about February 1 for Eugene. The courses of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural College will be inspected, it being the purpose of the board to determine what branches, if any, shall be eliminated from the courses of the two institutions and to inquire what courses are being duplicated.
