MONETARY COMMISSION
OF CANADIAN BANKSSystem Is Explained After Full
Investigation Is Made

Washington, Jan. 28.—Today was issued the first of the important series of financial monographs resulting from the exhaustive investigations pursued in this country and abroad under the auspices of the National Monetary Commission. "The History of Banking in Canada," by Rosell M. Breckenridge, who some twenty years ago, has been long recognized as authoritative. This monograph gains importance from the fact that the Canadian banking system, with its highly developed organization of branch banking, its large freedom of note issue, and its circulation-redemption fund has for many years attracted attention in this country. Some students of our banking problems have advocated the adoption of similar arrangements in the United States, and the National Monetary Commission has consequently made a comprehensive investigation of the history and actual operations of banking in Canada.

has brought the history of Canadian banking down to the present time and has discussed fully the changes and developments which have taken place since the date of publication of his original volume. The monograph is replete with facts and statistics showing the growth and present condition of the Canadian banks.

Mr. Breckenridge shows that the Canadian system is in many respects similar to the Scotch banking system; it is primarily and fundamentally a branch banking system. There are today, it appears, only 29 banks in Canada, and 19 of that number have their head offices in Toronto and Montreal, their branches numbering more than 2000, being distributed from the Atlantic to the Pacific, into the Yukon country, and even into foreign countries. Of the parent banks, however, there are more than three with head offices west of Ontario.

The authorized capital of any bank organized since 1890 is required to be at least \$500,000, of which at least \$250,000 must be paid in cash before the bank is authorized to commence business. Each bank may issue its notes, payable to bearer on demand and intended for circulation as money, but the total amount of notes of any bank in circulation could not, prior to the amendment of 1908, exceed the unimpaired paid-up capital of the bank. By the amendment of 1908, which grew out of the emergency issues of Dominion (or government) notes during the American panic of 1907, a bank, in addition to its regular circulation, may, during the usual season of moving the crops—that is, from the 1st day of October in each year to the 31st day of January next ensuing—issue its notes to an amount not exceeding 15 per cent of its combined paid-up capital and reserve. These additional notes are subject to a special tax at a rate not exceeding 5 per cent per annum, fixed by the governor in council.

The payment of the notes in case of failure of the issuing bank is secured in several ways. The notes are a first lien upon the assets of the bank; each stockholder is liable for any deficiency in the assets to an amount equal to the par value of the shares held by him, in addition to any amount not paid up thereon, and there is a "bank circulation redemption fund," in charge of the government, which is contributed by the banks. Each bank is required to keep to its credit in this fund 5 per cent in cash upon the average amount of its notes in circulation from year to year. In case of suspension of payment, the notes of a bank draw interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum from the day of suspension until the date named by notice when they will be redeemed. When the circulation fund is depleted from any cause, a call is made upon the banks to replenish it at a rate not exceeding 1 per cent per annum of the bank's circulation.

In addition to these provisions for maintaining the soundness of the notes, there are several requirements of law for the purpose of insuring their current redemption at par in all parts of the Dominion. The notes must be redeemed at the parent or head office of the banks and at agencies at commercial centers in each province which are fixed by law and at such other places as the treasury board of the Dominion may designate. The Canadian system differs from that of the United States in the absence of any requirement for the maintenance of a fixed reserve against liabilities of the banks, either notes or deposits, and in the absence of any system of governmental inspection of the banks. The policy has gradually grown up, however, of considering a reserve of 15 per cent desirable against demand liabilities, and banks falling below this are likely to be admonished by the bankers' association.

The chartered banks are members of the Canadian Bankers' association, founded in 1882, which was given the status of a public corporation under the amendment of 1900, and was authorized to establish clearing houses for banks in any place in the Dominion and to make rules for their government, and, however, to the approval of the treasury board. To it was also given supervisory control of the note issues of the banks in order to promote uniformity and to prevent fraudulent over-issues, and the power to take charge of the affairs of a failed bank through a curator. By these and other powers it exercises a large measure of influence over the policies and practices of the banks in general.

INSURANCE FRAUDS
ARE UNCOVERED

Agents and Physicians of Louisville Are Accused of Swindling

Louisville, Jan. 27.—John J. Kean, P. J. Needham and T. T. O'Leary, agents representing a number of insurance companies in Indiana, Tennessee, Kentucky, and other states tonight were arrested on warrant charging them with conspiracy to defraud. The warrants were sworn out by S. C. Renick, secretary and treasurer of the Indiana National Life Insurance Company.

While the amount involved is not stated, it is understood to reach \$200,000 or more in policies alleged to have been written on the lives of persons virtually certain to die within a few months—the fraud consisting of the impersonation of sick and incurable persons by healthy ones employed for the purpose.

It is believed the alleged conspiracy is far-reaching, and investigation will be made not only here, but in New Albany, Ind., and perhaps in other cities.

Fraud Involves Fifty Persons

It is stated that the arrest of these men is only the first step in the investigation of an affair that involves more than 50 persons and relates to fraudulently obtained life insurance policies to the value of more than \$200,000. It is also said that many physicians are involved.

One physician, it is said, has admitted that he acted as a participant in a conspiracy by filling out medical certificates testifying that men and women he had never seen were good insurance risks.
