EFFORT TO RAISE BONUS ABANDONED

Committee Trying to Raise the
Money to Secure Railway
Extension Quits

The soliciting committee for the proposed extension of the street railway around college hill have practically decided to suspend their efforts to raise the required bonus of \$10,000 due to the apathy of interested property owners. The members of the committee have devoted a great deal of time to the work and while many have subscribed liberally, others are holding off, and if they have not refused positively to subscribe, have put the committee off so long, and required so many visits that they feel it is useless to attempt to raise the money. The list now totals about \$25,000, subscribed and promised, and it would require more effort to raise the additional \$15,000 than the committee feel they can devote to it, and are willing to assume that their belief that the line was greatly desired by the property owners of the southwest part of the city, was not well-founded.

What looks still darker for the enterprise is the knowledge that the railway company is not especially anxious to make the extension, having made the proposition, as they supposed, in response to a popular demand. The officials of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern will, therefore, make no special effort to secure the acceptance of their terms and will not be disappointed should further efforts be discontinued, as now seems almost certain.

Professor Charles A. Cole, assistant chief of pomology at the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, has been engaged by Manager Freeman, of the promotion department of the Commercial Club, to address the farmers and public at general at the Lane county court house in Eugene on Saturday afternoon and evening, February 12. The promotion department will try to do a lot of work this year along the line of assisting the fruit raisers to achieve better results and to stimulate and encourage the fruit industry in this county. Manager Freeman will bring the best of authorities here from time to time to address the fruit growers on the most complete methods of fruit culture. A man from the Hood River apple district will be secured next after Professor Cole. Much publicity will be given these meetings, and as large a number of fruit raisers and farmers as possible will be induced to attend them.

Employment of a state organizer to effect organizations of retail merchants in towns where none exist.

Better enforcement of the pure food law and more attention to duty by the dairy and food commissioner and his staff.

Payment of cartage charges by the wholesale houses. Saddling these charges on the retailers was termed a graft.

Reporting removals by the local secretary of bad debtors from one section to another.

JEFF CALLS JOHNSON NIGGER AND SKUNK

Portland, Jan. 29.—"It is none of my business where the fight takes place," said James J. Jeffries in Portland yesterday. "I have no more to do with the scene of the fight with the 'nigger' than I have with the routing of this show."

Jeffries used the term "nigger," not lightly, but as an expression of designed contempt.

"I am under contract to meet Jack Johnson under the auspices of Tex Rickard and Jack Gleason, and where they decree to pull off the fight is where I will meet the 'skunk.' I've got nothing to do with the place. My preferences are my own, but they won't have anything to do with the decision of the men who offered the highest bid. 'Tex' Rickard and Jack Gleason will settle the question themselves."

Jeffries arrived here at noon in a special car with H. H. Frazee, all-star athletic combination. Several thousand fans went to the union station to meet him. The pressure of the crowd was so great that Jack Grant and the other members of the reception committee had difficulty in wedging a way through to the automobile in which they were conveyed to the Oregon Hotel.

"Same California newspapermen are charging me with passing up San Francisco and Los Angeles," Jeffries continued. "That isn't fair. I'm under contract to Mr. Frazee of Chicago. In this tour, and I go wherever he routes me. I don't know whether he has passed up San Francisco or not, but if he has it's his business and not mine. I've always played fair, and I think other people ought to be fair with me."
