It is necessary to enlist the personal interest of the possible planning on giving parties, dances, etc., and these are all very good methods to get interest created.

False Rumors.

False rumors of all sorts will be going around and the contestant should not allow anyone to discourage her by telling different things they have heard. Kindly remember they are not in a position to judge the contest as well as you.
The contest manager has been through many contests and he knows what is most liable to happen in any

big contest. Remember this, the girl who works will win.

Future Subscriptions

Contestants may find in some cases friends who wish to help them in the contest by subscribing for the Daily Guard, but are already taking a local paper, which is paid in advance, and not desiring to receive more than one local daily in their homes at the same time, the contest department has arranged to accept and issue votes on all such subscriptions; the paper to start at a future date that the subscriber may designate.

This ruling also applies to any second payment you may secure, but in all cases six months or more must be added to entitle you to the second payment. ment." This ruling is also good on mail subscriptions taken at the \$3 rate. In fact, all subscriptions.
