STATEMENT ON BOND ELECTION

Mayor, City Recorder and City Attorney Explain Object of Proposed Issue

The proposition made by the council to issue bonds to the amount of \$150,000, for the purpose of refunding the general indebtedness of the city should have your approval. This is not an increase of the indebtedness of the city, but a proposition to pay off the indebtedness of the city and to secure the money for that purpose at five per cent interest per annum.

The debt which the city desires to pay with the proceeds of the proposed bond issue was incurred principally for paving and other street improvements of the city. The city at once issued warrants for the cost of the pavement and has allowed the citizens to pay their assessments on the installment plan at the rate of one-tenth of the assessment each year, so that the indebtedness of the city will be practically wiped out when the assessments for paving the streets are collected. There is no doubt whatever about the city's ability to pay the assessments as it has a lien upon all the property abutting upon paved streets, for the cost of the pavement in front of said property.

It is proposed to apply the money coming from assessments to the payment of the bonds to be voted on at the special election. With the large amount of warrants outstanding against the city on account of the paving of the streets, the payment of the warrants drawn for current expenses is postponed for such a long time that the banks are unwilling to cash the present warrants at par value, so that contractors and other persons doing work for the city are not willing to give the city as good terms on their contracts as they would be if the warrants could be cashed at once. Let every voter bear in mind that to borrow this \$150,000 for the purpose specified does not increase the city's indebtedness one penny, but simply changes the form of the indebtedness to a bond indebtedness, at a less rate of interest than the city is now paying.

This proposition has the endorsement of every taxpayer who is interested in the financial condition of Eugene, irrespective of any municipal policy.

It is believed that if every voter understood the purpose of the proposed bond issue that they would approve it unanimously.
