SIX WOMEN ENTER FINAL DEBATE CONTEST

That Number Qualified for the Tryout—Other University News

At the second preliminary tryout for choosing the co-ed debating team at the University of Oregon six women were selected to enter the final contest. The tryout, according to statements made by the judges, showed a great improvement in some of the speakers since the previous tryout. They knew better what was expected of them, and seemed to have better control of themselves.

"What student wouldn't pay a quarter to hear Oregon's women debate?" says Manager Steele. "I'll get the Glee Club to sing if I can, and charge 25 cents admission, and get a crowd out and show the girls that we are behind them in their contests and really believe in them taking part in student activities."

The time of speaking will be seven minutes for constructive argument, and three for rebuttal. Those trying out are: Fay Clark, '12, of McMinnville, prominent in Eutaxian and Y. W. C. A. work, and a member of the Oregon Emerald staff; Lila Clark, a junior from Portland, who has always shown up well in Eutaxian debates. Carin Degermark is a freshman from Lincoln High, Portland, and is the only freshman who qualified in the preliminaries. Hazel McKown, '12, is a Eugene girl who has always taken a great interest in forensic work. Birdi Wise, '12, is from Astoria High school. She represented that school on the debating team two years, the last year in the High school league when it won the state championship. Willetta Wright, '11, is a new student this far, entering from Albany College, where she took a leading part in forensic work.

University Bulletin.
The November number of the University of Oregon Bulletin, which was edited by Professor Frederic Stanley Dunn, head of the department of Latin, on "A Study of the Roman Coins of the Empire," has been widely commented on and copied by Eastern papers and magazines. The latest to reprint it here was a well-known paper, "The Record of the Past," published in Washington, D. C., and the "Classical Weekly." The latter prints another article by Professor Dunn on the confusion of Haller's Comet with the "Julia Star," this being also reprinted in the Popular Astronomy Review for March, 1910.

Good Orator.
That the University of Oregon's representative at Salem next Friday night will give a good account of himself, that his oration is one of the best and most consistent winners that was ever turned out, was demonstrated in the tryout last week, when, for the second time, a set of judges selected H. J. Rounds as the best orator in college, and the audience unanimously pronounced it a great improvement on the intercollegiate tryout. This is the first time in the history of the University of Oregon that the same man has represented her in both the interstate and intercollegiate contest. Rounds is a senior and a member of the Philologist Society.

PREACHER QUILTS TO ACCEPT UMPIRE JOB

Peoria, Ill., March 7.—Rev. George Schroeder, pastor of the First Congregational Church at Elmwood, has been signed as umpire in the Illinois and Michigan League. When his application for the position of umpire was accepted, he tendered his resignation to the Congregational Church, feeling that his duties as umpire would conflict with those attending his ministry. The resignation was accepted. Rev. Mr. Schroeder received his contract while still serving his flock but kept it unsigned until action was taken on his resignation.

SIX-DAY RACE IN NEW YORK

New York, March 8.—More than a score of teams representing a dozen nations are entered today in the international six-day go-as-you-please race at Madison Square Garden. Many of the contestants have already won championships abroad, and the rivalry for first honors promises to be sensational. In the construction of the track, layers of foam, tan bark and sawdust were used, and the track has been officially surveyed, so that in the event of any records being made they will be recognized. The track is eighteen feet wide.

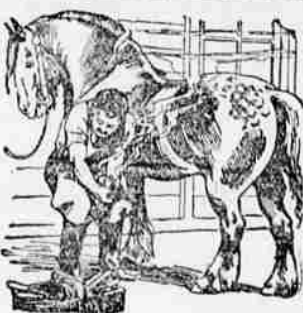
