EXTENSION OF CITY LIMITS BEFORE CENSUS

Council Passes An Ordinance Shortening Time for Notice of Election

At a meeting of the city council last night, adjourned at the previous meeting for that special purpose, an ordinance was passed to regulate the time of the initiative resolution passed at the meeting March 15, extending the limits of this city. This ordinance brings the election for the annexation of the outlying suburbs on the west and southwest, also Hendricks' park, at the time of the regular election on April 4, and if the proposition carries these suburbs will be included in the federal census which begins on April 15. An emergency clause was attached and the ordinance is now in effect.

Street Ordinances

An ordinance for the grading and graveling of West Tenth street, from Van Buren to Monroe, was passed.

An ordinance to construct a sewer on the south side of Mill street between East Fifteenth and East Sixteenth, to Alder, was passed.

An ordinance levying assessment for the improvement of East Twenty-first street, from University avenue to Fairmount boulevard, in the Gross addition, was passed.

An ordinance to grade and gravel the alleys running both ways in the block bounded by East Tenth and East Eleventh and Pearl and High streets was passed.

An ordinance to grade and gravel West Third street, from Monroe to Blair, was passed.

A petition for a sidewalk on University avenue, from East Fifteenth street to East Twenty-first street, was referred to the street committee, as was also a petition for a sidewalk on the east side of Orchard avenue to Fairmount boulevard.

Miscellaneous Matters

Water Superintendent S. W. Taylor reported that the proposed extension of water mains at West Twelfth and Lincoln streets would require 160 feet of 2 1/2 inch mains.

Street Commissioner Turner reported the use of 11,181 feet of lumber during the month of February.

The bill of the Westinghouse Electrical Company for \$1646 for transformers for the municipal electric plant was ordered paid.

At this time the minutes of the several meetings of the council in February up to the regular meeting in March were read and approved.

Councilman Garrett reported that a Mrs. Lang had asked that she be not charged interest on delayed payment for street improvements, as she claimed that she was never notified of the improvement, she being out of the city for several years. This brought out a general discussion in regard to cutting off the interest in such cases. It was the sense of the meeting that interest should be collected from all, and that greater efforts should be made to locate owners where street improvements have been made so they can be notified of the improvements.

The meeting adjourned until next Monday night.

EX-RECEIVER DEVLIN TELLS INSIDE FACTS Declares That President Moore Knew of Rottenness of the Bank

Portland, Or., March 22.—Thomas C. Devlin, receiver of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, was the main witness for the prosecution yesterday at the trial of Walter S. Moore, ex-president of the wrecked institution. Responding to a running fire of questions put by Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald, Mr. Devlin testified that Moore knew the bank's books contained false entries and that Moore had used the bank's money in the Pacific & Eastern railroad deal.

Further testimony by Mr. Devlin intimated that Moore, after trying to conceal his knowledge of the extent to which the Golden Eagle store had used funds from the bank, admitted that he knew of the transactions between the bank and that establishment. After this admission, said Mr. Devlin, Moore produced the notes, mutilated by the names of the makers being torn off, and surrendered them to the receiver a short time after the bank suspended payment.

Huge Losses Listed

Mr. Devlin cited startling figures, made public officially for the first time, to show the extent of Moore's alleged knowledge of the condition of the bank, and the apparent lack of caution exercised in handling its funds. With liabilities of \$2,500,000, the bank closed with only \$15,000 in cash in its vaults. Including notes, good and bad, bonds and stocks, valuable and useless, and all other types of securities, taken at their face value, there was only \$2,209,000 in assets.

In notes there was \$625,747.39 outstanding. All of this, with the exception of a small proportion, had been loaned without mortgage or collateral. Out of 500 notes only 129 were secured. Overdrafts on the last day figured \$257,144.86, of which \$101,638.04 had been advanced to the Golden Eagle, in which rumor reports W. Cooper Morris, the cashier, had a personal interest. To the Board of Trade Building Association, of which Moore was virtually sole owner, \$97,735.74 had been advanced.

According to the calculations of Mr. Devlin, the losses actually incurred by the bank through the dealings of Moore and Morris, these transactions added to losses incurred through unsecured loans made to others, reached \$150,000.

From the estimate made by Mr. Devlin, the losses incurred by the various deals were: Pacific & Eastern railroad, \$19,000; Board of Trade building, \$50,000; Order of Washington, \$50,000; Life Pence, \$9,000; Barrett Manufacturing Company, \$18,000; Pullman Auto Car Company, \$11,500; A. J. McCabe, contractor, connected with the Pacific & Eastern Railroad, \$5,000.

MR. SMITH WRITES AGAIN ON TELEPHONES

Therefore we greatly need another company in Eugene to prevent so much business accumulating in the hands of one company. But it is hard to understand why \$150,000,000 would not be a fair profit on the capitalization of every telephone company in the United States. It just looks this way

—the company has made the farmers generally buy their phones and of course they own their own lines, and the company can raise the switch charges 500 or 600 per cent and the farmers will pay it rather than be cut loose from the central exchange. I will just say that if the farmers cannot get fair treatment they are fools to patronize any company rather than put in their own switchboard. I would like to ask Mr. Heaton how, if increase of business decreases the profits, that his company gives Tacoma, Wash., with its 102,000 population, cheaper rates than Eugene, with its 10,000 or 12,000? We all know that the Standard Oil Company controls the Pacific States Telephone Company, and we know how void of soul it is, and if they can for one year declare a dividend of \$150,000,000, what does it matter what states it comes from? Farmers, all be at the meeting on the 26th.

METHODISTS HAVE SELECTED LOT FOR NEW CHURCH BUILDING Will Build on Rowland and Hadley Lots on South Willamette Street

The Guard's story, printed on Monday, March 14, telling of the intentions of the Eugene Methodists to erect a splendid new church building this year, was confirmed by an official announcement last night of the board of trustees that it has been decided to purchase the Rowland and Hadley residence properties on South Willamette street, near Twelfth, for the new structure. This lot is 150x160 feet in dimensions. The announcement was made at the quarterly conference of the church, held last night.

As predicted by The Guard, it was decided to sell the property at Tenth and Willamette streets, on which the old church stands, and use the money from the sale toward erecting a finer church edifice than now exists in the city, and perhaps better than any other to be erected in the near future.

A building committee has been appointed, and this committee will at once begin the work of securing plans for the structure, which will doubtless be of stone.
