OREGON SHUTS OUT WHITMAN IN A CORKING GAME

Henkle's corking smash to centre field in the seventh inning sent Jamison home from second base and won for Oregon against Whitman by the score of 1 to 0 in a game replete with sensational features yesterday afternoon.

After pitching his team mates to victory Saturday, Henkle went into the box again for the Oregonians and twirled a great game. Although the big southpaw was hit freely, with no one on bases, when the sacks were loaded his delivery was an enigma to the Whitman batters. Beside winning his own game with the deciding hit, he fielded his position in perfect style.

Accepting nine hard chances without an error, the Oregon team played errorless ball behind Henkle. For six innings the game was a pitchers' battle, with Belt, of Whitman, also pitching fine ball. In the sixth Clark's perfect throw from deep centre of Borleske's hit nipped Belt between third base and home plate, where he was run down by the Oregon field. Clark played a sensational fielding game and made a single and two-bagger in four times at bat. Jamison's running catch, a foul off the first base bleachers, and Borleske's work at third were also features.

Whitman started a batting rally in the ninth, when Schubert and Felt-house hit safe and Cox walked with two down, but Henkle saved his own game when he grabbed Penger's bad bouncer and threw him out at first. The victories against Whitman put Oregon at the top of the Big Six Conference Baseball League.

FOOTBALL RULES DO

NOT SUIT HERE

Football rule changes announced by the National Intercollegiate rules committee on Saturday do not meet with favor in Portland, says the Oregonian. Local football authorities and players who have been connected with the game for many years are almost unanimous in branding the changes as a compromise which is at once ineffectual and destructive of the game. That the game will suffer, both from the viewpoint of the spectator and the player is the general opinion. One football authority denounces some of the proposed changes as ridiculous, and the beginning of the end of the game is foreseen in the sweeping changes which have been announced.

The old players did not take kindly to the changes. The general opinion voiced is that the changes add to the danger of the play, rather than take from it. The innovations are called illogical, unnecessary and unsatisfactory.

What Earl Says. Virgil D. Earl, a former U. of O. star, now professor and football coach at Washington High school, believes that a reform has been attained by the rules but expresses a fear that they may go too far.

"I liked the old game better, but I am of the opinion the committee must know its business and is really eliminating the danger," said Professor Earl. "I fail to note any special advantage in changing the length of the halves. I do not like the proposal to bring the ends in on defense. That would result in too much scoring and would make possible for a team with a fast back to score at will. The game should be better for high school students under the new rules."

"The opposition to the game on the part of the regents is too strong to be overcome by the imagined 'reforms' the National Rules Committee annually make," continued Chancellor Strong. "Furthermore, the other schools of the Missouri Valley appear to be as greatly opposed to the present game as is the University of Kansas, and it will be a matter of great surprise to me if the game is ever again played by the Missouri Valley conference teams."

Chancellor Strong, while willing that the English Rugby game be given a trial, is in favor of a radical revision of the American game.

CATCHER KLING

IS REINSTATED

Excelsior Springs, Mo., March 28.—Catcher Johnny Kling, formerly a member of the Chicago National League baseball club, will be reinstated, but reinstated in organized baseball sometime next week, but it will not be with the consent of President Ban Johnson, of the American League.

The report of the findings in the Kling case will be signed by Garry Hermann, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, and Thomas J. Lynch, president of the National League, who, with Johnson, compose the commission. For the good of organized baseball President Johnson will not submit a minority report, but nevertheless he has decided opinions regarding Kling's desertion of the game last year. However, he says Lynch is a new man in office, and if he has made a mistake in this case, which Johnson believes he has, it would only harm the national pastime for him to discuss the National League president's alleged error.

Johnson Withholds Assent. Johnson, who is taking the baths here, requested today that his name be removed from the report of the commission in the Kling case.

"I believe a mistake has been made by the commission," he said, "but I shall offer no criticism of the work of Messrs. Lynch and Hermann. They constitute the majority and whatever they decide must stand, regardless of anything I might say."
