

EMIL KOPPE ONLY CANDIDATE IN 2ND WARD

Moon Withdraws as Candidate
For Councilman—Koppe Favors the Administration

Emil Koppe, the independent candidate for councilman from the Second ward has come out unqualifiedly in favor of the policies of the administration and especially for the completion of the municipal power plant on the McKenzie river, and W. S. Moon, who has been nominated on the administration ticket from that ward, will withdraw, leaving Mr. Koppe the only candidate in that ward.

Mr. Koppe, who is manager of the Eugene woolen mills, was visited by a committee of citizens consisting of C. S. Frank, M. D. Mitchell, J. B. Hopkins and J. O. Watts at his office this morning and was asked to state plainly his attitude toward the administration, the power plant proposition. He stated emphatically and with vehemence that he is now as has always been in favor of going ahead with the power plant and stated further that the city should establish an electric light plant of its own.

With this understanding Mr. Moon will withdraw and there will be only one candidate for councilman in that ward.

Mr. Koppe's nomination was circulated and signed by many voters with the understanding that he was in favor of the policies of the administration, and those who signed the paper with that belief are glad to learn that he has come out with a public statement on the matter.

PUPILS APRIL 15

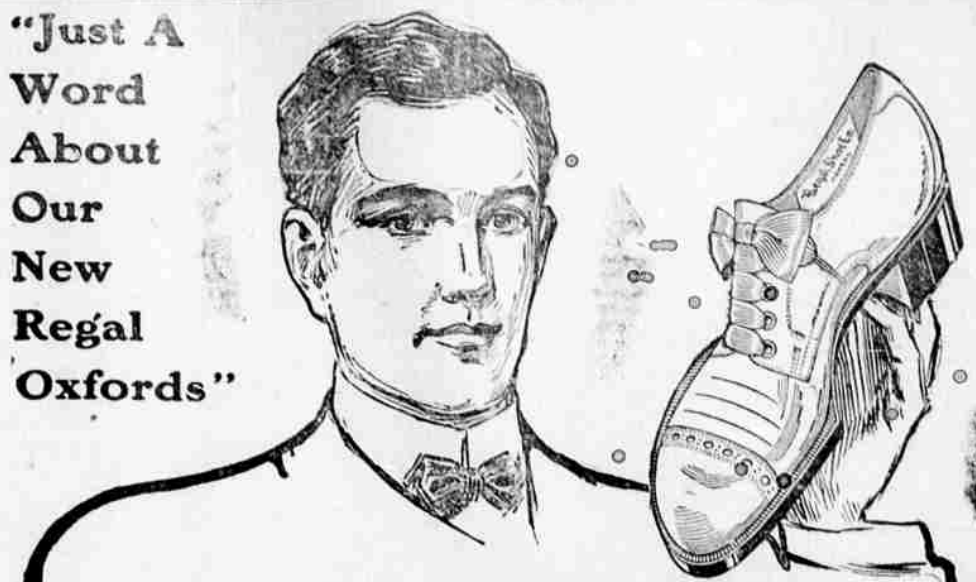
Program to Be Rendered in the
