PORTLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FAVORS OPEN SHOP POLICY

Portland, April 6.—A strong resolution, committing the influence of the Chamber of Commerce to keeping Portland an "open shop" city was passed yesterday morning at the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees of that organization. Prior to the passing of the resolution, a conference was held with a delegation representing the Oregon Employers' Association. This delegation was composed of M. C. Harfield, W. H. Corbett, E. L. Thompson and A. C. Callan.

With the delegation the trustees were over the situation. It was decided that labor agitators are in Portland stirring up the various trade unions to strike for a "closed shop" policy throughout the city and state. The resolution passed unanimously. A statement of the position taken by the chamber on the question will be issued later. Until then the full text of the resolution will not be known, or will the extent of the proposed action be taken.

SUPREME COURT JARS PINCHOT POLICY

Washington, March 6.—The recent decision of the United States supreme court that the forest service is without authority to prosecute criminally persons who violate their regulations bids fair to undermine much of the work of the ex-forester, Gifford Pinchot, and may and probably will result in a more or less complete reorganization of the methods of the forest service.

This decision, coming from the highest court in the land, leaves no question as to the illegality of the multitudinous acts of Mr. Pinchot, and sustains the complaint long made in the West that the forest service was arrogating to itself powers which could be exercised by congress alone. And, incidentally, the supreme court has placed its stamp of approval on many of the contentions of Senator Stephen, reiterated time and again in his seven-year fight.

WARNER WILL BE COACH OF OREGON FOOTBALL TEAM

Cornell Man to Teach University Squad How to Win

William J. Warner, a brother of Glenn S. Warner, the famous football coach of the Carlisle Indians, will coach the University of Oregon football team next fall. This was definitely settled yesterday, when President Campbell telegraphed Warner at Buffalo, N. Y., that his terms had been accepted.

One of the choices of a football coach had been awaited with interest by Oregon students and alumni for some time, for Oregon has been the last Northwest team to engage its coach, but there was considerable surprise when it became known that Warner was the lucky candidate. It was generally understood that a Yale man would be selected if possible to follow up the plan given by "Bob" Forbes, the big Yale and former All-American who took a team of rough men and whipped them into such good shape by the use of the "Yale system" that they were beaten only by the University of Washington veteran team for the Northwest championship last year.

Warner has a splendid record as a successful football player and coach. He played at Cornell four years and made the All-American eleven as guard in 1901. Following that he was head coach at Cornell, and then came to the Pacific coast, where he took the team of the Sherman Indians in California, and turned out an eleven which won the coast championship. He duplicated the feat two years later.

Warner has also coached the University of South Carolina. Under his direction the Southern collegians easily won all their games. Warner has the reputation of never having turned out a losing eleven. His brother, Glenn Warner, of the Carlisle Indians, is crowned as one of the "greatest" coaches and foremost football authorities in the country. In collaboration with his brother he has developed more startling trick plays and formations than almost any other coach.

FINEST GYMNASIUM IN WEST IS OPEN

All Apparatus Is Placed and Regular Classes Will Be Formed At Once

The finest equipped gymnasium in the West is now complete at the University of Oregon. Every article of apparatus is now placed and regular classes are to be formed at once by Trainer Hayward. Everything is now ready in the new building except the big swimming tank, which will be finished next fall.

The equipment was selected by Mr. Hayward and installed under the supervision of an expert mechanical engineer sent from the factory.

The apparatus and steel lockers were furnished by the Fred Medant Mfg. Co., the pioneers in this business. The equipment is one of the most complete and modern in the West and consists of horizontal bars, parallel bars, horses, ladders, pulley weight machine, rowing machines, flying rings, traveling rings, trapezes and the numerous articles needed in a well-equipped gymnasium.

All of the fixed apparatus is arranged so it can be taken from the floor in the fraction of a moment. The whole series of traveling rings can be adjusted by merely winding a winch which is self-locking, and will stay in any position desired.

The horizontal bars can be folded against the gallery by winding on a winch and a mechanism which can be thrown in by the foot instantaneously. The hole in the floor in which the locking arrangement of the horizontal bars is closed automatically by small brass caps.

All of the suspended apparatus has upon it pulley blocks arranged so as it can readily be raised up out of the way.

The equipment is very similar to the big gymnasium in the University of Wisconsin at Madison, and is also like the Minnesota equipment at Minneapolis. It contains practically all the equipment manufactured for gymnasium work.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 5.—The track situation at O. A. C. is not what it should be, for the number of men who are doing active training is considerably under what is required to uphold the honor of the "Orange." The selection of a trainer was a matter of doubt until Physical Director Angell proffered his services and was accepted. The team lost by graduation last year Chapman and Hall, first place men in the high jump and hammer throw respectively. Carl Wolff, the crack weight man, was obliged to leave school some weeks ago.

The men here are training faithfully and are not worried by bad weather since the completion of the new armory. The sprints will have almost a new set of men. Armstrong, the individual point winner of the inter-company meet, Harney, Weatherford, Rasmussen, Seimens and Evenden are at work on the dashes. The hurdles will probably taken care of by Captain McGman, Sallet, Armstrong and Hawley. In the distance runs Williams, Thompson, Brown, Burdick, Reynolds and Seimens are making a good showing. Hawley, Brethaupt, Nickerson and Shattuck are taking care of the jumps at present, while Armstrong and Burdick are practically alone in the pole vault.

There are some good men in the weights, but the number is low. They are the Endberg and Graham, of last year's team, and new track men, McKenzie and Sandstrom.

JOHNSON NOT GUILTY OF SPEEDING

Chicago, April 5.—Jack Johnson, the prizefighter, was not granted his request for two negroes on the jury that heard the testimony in his trial for automobile speeding yesterday before Judge S. Coker, in the municipal court, but the 12 Caucasians who sat on the jury proved satisfactory to the pugilist by promptly returning a verdict of "not guilty."

"They saved me the trouble of going to the supreme court with the case," said Johnson. "I am not going to have the police put it all over me just because I am a well-known man. If I ran around and got drunk and gambled the cops ought to pinch me, but I am a good family man and behave myself. If every one was like me it would be a good world."
