HOMER DAVENPORT IN EUGENE AGAIN

Will Lecture Tonight and Tomorrow Night at Presbyterian Church

The 2:04 train this afternoon brought Homer Davenport, Oregon's famous cartoonist, lecturer-traveler, with his Bedouin servant boy, to this city, after an absence of six years. Davenport is one of Oregon's celebrated native sons, having drawn for the prominent Hearst papers in New York, traveled through Arabia and Egypt in search of fine Arabian horses, been presented to kings and queens in the Orient, and carried on a crusade in the Morning Oregonian a couple of years ago in behalf of humane society work. He is in Oregon now in the interests of a newspaper magazine, on the plan of Collier's, the National Geographic, which he intends to publish in Portland.

Homer Davenport, who has many friends in Eugene, several of whom knew him on his tour near Silverton, as a small boy, spoke in Eugene in 1904 in the High school assembly to a packed house, and one of the cartoons he drew then for Mrs. Osburn is framed and hanging in the Hoffman House lobby. Mr. Davenport gives his greatest lecture, "A Trip Through Arabia," at the Central Presbyterian church this evening, in which Sled Abdullah, his native Bedouin servant boy, in Oriental costume, plays an important part. This lecture is said to be the most interesting and unique travelogue ever given on the American platform. On Friday evening the subject is "The Power of the Cartoon," Davenport's most graphic lecture, which he illustrates with cartoons drawn on the stage.

RESOLUTIONS ON DEATH OF JUDGE GEORGE H. WILLIAMS

In honor of the memory of Judge George H. Williams, whom President Campbell characterized as the greatest man Oregon ever had, the following resolution was passed yesterday morning by the associated students of the University of Oregon. Also as a tribute to Oregon's great pioneer statesman, President Campbell delivered in glowing words a full sketch of his life and then eulogized upon the noble characteristics of the man. The resolution was eagerly passed by a rising vote.

The citizenship of Oregon and the nation at large should and probably will turn in thought to the memory of one who was Oregon's most illustrious citizen. His great deed of honor was won wholly through constructive service to the public weal. It is meet, therefore, that we, associated here as the University, with our largest and most distinctive purpose that of preparation for and performance—to the assurance of our abilities—of the best service for the common good, should as a body turn to pay some humble tribute to his memory. In so doing we honor ourselves and will be led to emulate him.

I submit, therefore, that this University resolve that it express a sense of deepest gratitude for Judge Geo. H. Williams' pre-eminent services to Oregon and to our nation; that it admire his abounding loyalty to the largest and highest good, his statesmanship as a leader in the affairs of this nation in time of greatest crises; that it honors him for his splendid virtues as a citizen and as a man.

ADVOCATES LARGER AND BETTER GROUNDS AT PATTERSON SCHOOL

The following resolutions have been adopted by the Patron-Teachers' Association of the Patterson school:

Whereas, We believe that the full and proper education of the child should include a strong body as well as a well-developed mind; and

Whereas, the present condition of the playground of the Patterson school renders it unfit for use; and

Whereas, the children in the school during the greater part of the year, thus restricting the children in their play and hindering them from getting a sufficient amount of exercise, making them restless during school hours and more difficult to control, therefore be it

Resolved, by the Patron-Teachers' Association of the Patterson school, That the school board be, and hereby is petitioned, to place said school grounds in proper condition by having them filled so that the water will not stand on them during the rainy season, or by erecting a shed on the play ground so that it can be used during the stormy weather; and be it further

Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be spread on the minutes of the association, a copy be handed to the press for publication, and a copy be sent to the board of directors.

JOHN A. McMAHAN, EARLY PIONEER, DIES Death Occurs Early This Morning After a Long Illness of Paralysis

John A. McMahan, one of the best-known residents of Lane county, died at his home at 722 Washington street in Eugene this morning at 12:30 o'clock, after a long illness of paralysis, at the age of 69 years. The funeral will be held at the First Christian church Friday at 2 p. m., with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. D. C. Kellems will conduct the services.

John A. McMahan was born at Jamestown, Hendricks county, Indiana, April 12, 1841. In 1842 he, with his parents, moved to Illinois, where he remained until May 25, 1864, at which time he, seeing greater opportunities in the West, left his kindred and started in a train of 30 wagons, comprising sixty men, besides women and children, over the Oregon trail, arriving at Boise, Idaho, September 15th, in which vicinity he remained until October 1, 1865, when he started for Portland, Or., arriving there after nearly a month of travel. In March, 1869, he came to Lane county, where he engaged in logging and delivering to the O. & C. Railroad Co. until September 5, 1872, when he and Mrs. Catherine Callison were married and they established a home east of Springfield, where they remained until 1903. With the exception of one year, which was spent in Whitman county, Washington, March, 1890, he obeyed Christ and was baptized by D. C. Kellems, and ever since took a prominent part in the Kingdom of his Lord and Master.

He was always a public-spirited man of affairs. He served one term as county commissioner of Lane county. At the time of his death he was a member of the board of regents of the Eugene Bible University, and an elder of the Church of Christ at Eugene.

Owing to failing health it became necessary, in 1903, to leave the farm and the family removed to Eugene, where they have since resided. He departed this life April 7th, at 12:30 a. m., aged 68 years, 11 months and 25 days.

Deceased leaves a wife, Catherine; three daughters, Mrs. H. W. Eyer, of Springfield, Or.; Pearl and Minnie, of Eugene, Or.; and two brothers, Dr. C. W., of Louisville, Ky., and O. A., of Thurston, Or., to mourn the loss of a devoted husband, a loving father and brother.
