BIG COTTON FIGHT

New York, April 7.—"Wheat King" Jim Batten rushed into New York today and announced that he is after the scalp of George H. McFadden, head of the firm of McFadden Bros., the biggest firm of cotton brokers in the world.

"The whole trouble is that McFadden has been running the market," said Batten. "When he said 'buy' all these small brokers were scared to death."

Batten said he was not sure whether the drop of \$2.50 per bale in cotton in the last three days had cost him a million dollars or half that sum.

"I have been too busy to fight over trifling matters," was his comment. "I am not losing any sleep over the amounts that I have lost. If speculation cost me an hour's sleep I would quit speculating."

HANLEY, OF BURNS? IS INDICTED AGAIN

Rich Eastern Oregon Stockman and Capitalist Is Accused of Felling Government Timber

Portland, April 8.—William Hanley, of Burns, considered the wealthiest stockraiser of Eastern Oregon, will be arrested this morning to answer a secret indictment returned against him on March 22 by the federal grand jury, charging him with cutting timber on government land.

Mr. Hanley is visiting in Portland. Yesterday, when United States Marshal Reed called him by telephone at the Portland Hotel and informed him of the charge against him, Mr. Hanley asked that he be given until this morning before the papers were served, to allow him time to get bondsmen.

The request was granted. This is the second time the government has accused Mr. Hanley of violation of the federal laws. A year ago he was found guilty of fencing about \$2,000 acres of government land unlawfully, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and meet the costs of the case, which in all amounted to \$2230.96. The case was appealed to \$2230.96. The case was appealed to the United States appellate court in San Francisco May 4.

There are two charges against Mr. Hanley in the indictment of March 22, one alleging the cutting of 1000 cords of wood on public land in November, 1907, and the other accusing him of removing timber from public land in December, 1909.

If the Burns capitalist is found guilty he will be required to serve at least some time in jail, as the statute under which he is indicted provides that a fine shall be imposed of three times the value of the timber removed, and a sentence of imprisonment not to exceed 12 months shall be made a part of the punishment.

TWO BROTHERS

COMMIT SUICIDE

AT KANSAS CITY

Kansas City, Mo., April 8.—Financial losses incurred in a partnership brokerage firm business are believed to have caused the suicide of Nels and C. W. Olson, brothers, whose bodies were found on the bank of a river three miles east of the city.

The deaths, which were deliberately planned, on January 27, after a series of reverses in business, the brothers left their apartment house here and have not been seen since.

After their departure, relatives said the men had announced they had lost all they had and intended to kill themselves. Rumors had it that the losses amounted to between \$75,000 and \$100,000.
