Everything Originating North of Cottage Grove, Says Mr. Field

The Roseburg Review interviewed Superintendent Fields, of the S. P. Co., regarding a proposed new depot building in that city yesterday, and elicited the following information from him:

"When asked regarding the rumor that the passenger depot is to be transferred from its present location to the Oak street crossing, Mr. Fields shook his head negatively. 'Our only object in making such a change,' explained Mr. Fields, 'would be to provide room for a long-standing train, necessitating the closing of Oak street between the tracks and the river to give us a clear track for twenty standing cars between Lane and Washington streets. The necessity for more car room will be obviated, however, when the N. & W. line is completed. Once this line is in operation there will be no third less cars to handle in this city. Your constantly increasing local business, however, warrants another passenger depot building, as well as an enlargement of the freight house. These improvements will be made before the N. & W. line is finished. All through freight and passenger business originating north of Cottage Grove will be routed over the new line."

REGULAR PARTY LEADERS WANT BEVERIDGE BEATEN

Washington, April 8.—With deliberate emphasis Representative Sorano today gave his opinion of Senator Beveridge, and of the speech of the Indianan, made at the state Republican convention.

"I cannot see how any self-respecting Republican can vote for a single candidate on the Beveridge ticket or support the Beveridge platform," he said. "I call it the Beveridge ticket because it is in no sense a Republican ticket."

Representative John Dalzell, of Pennsylvania, was equally condemnatory in his remarks.

"I believe now that the Democrats will carry Indiana," he rumbled, "and what's more, I hope they will. I believe the next Indiana legislator will be Democratic, and that it will send to the senate a real Democrat in the place of Beveridge. If we are going to have Democrats in the senate, let's have the real thing."

NO PRELIMINARY FOR BIG BATTLE

New York, April 7.—Jack Gleason, one of the promoters of the Jeffries-Johnson fight, who is here today, has outlined the plan which he and Rickard intend to carry out on the day of the scrap at Coneyville. In discussing the scheme by which it is hoped to preserve order, Gleason said:

"There will be no grafting of any kind, and the first man caught at this game will be promptly thrown out. Instead of a preliminary bout we will have a popular band concert, which will be furnished by the best musicians we can find around San Francisco. The fans will see fighting enough when the big fellows come together. As a rule, preliminary fights are a joke, and this is the principal reason why we have decided to cut them out."

"There will be no bar and no liquor of any kind will be sold inside of the arena. Neither will we allow the sale of peanuts or pops or soft drinks, for we don't want to take any chance of persons being hurt in the event of a bottle-slinging contest. All the fans will be urged not to bring weapons with them, and all suspicious persons will be searched at the entrance."

HAMMER THROW

RETAINED AT WHITMAN

Walla Walla, April 8.—The javelin throw, which was to have been substituted for the hammer throw at the Whitman College meet on May 5 and has been withdrawn because of the objections raised by the High schools of Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Last year there were 200 athletes here and this season, with the addition of three more schools, an even larger representation is expected. Spokane High won the silver trophy the last two years, and a victory this season will give the South Central athletes permanent possession of the cup.

COTTAGE GROVE CLUB NOW A STRONG BODY

Campaign for Members Gives Net Gain of 150; Albany Sends Visitors

Cottage Grove, Or., April 7.—A delegation from the Albany Commercial Club attended the regular meeting of the Cottage Grove Club Monday evening by special invitation from this organization. A number of addresses were made, the principal one by Wallace R. Stoble, secretary of the Albany Commercial Club, who spoke along the lines of the development of Oregon, the proposed creation of Neath county being a feature. W. E. Kibby, editor of the Albany Herald, called attention to the open river convention that is to be held at Albany April 14, and it was decided to send a big delegation to Albany, and a special meeting of the Commercial Club was called for tomorrow evening, when the matter of chartering a special car will be taken up and arrangements completed for the trip. Addresses were also made by the newly elected city officers, and the matter of civic improvements was a prominent topic. The Albany delegation was met at the train by the Cottage Grove band. A banquet was served at the conclusion of the meeting.

Within the past month an active campaign has been carried on by the Commercial Club for new members, which has resulted in a net gain of 150, making this club one of the strongest factors in the Oregon Development League. The club now numbers 185 members.

UNIVERSITY SORORITIES JOIN NATIONAL BODY

The Pan-Hellenic Association, an organization of college women's National sororities and Greek letter fraternities for the purpose of regulating "rushings" and other events of sorority life, was formed yesterday by the three local chapters at the University of Oregon.

The members in the order of their installation at the University are the Gamma Phi Beta sorority, the Chi Omega sorority, and the Kappa Alpha Theta sorority. Miss Ruth Hansen, Miss Bertha Dorris and Miss Frances Oberlin, of the three chapters, respectively, were elected president, secretary and treasurer.

The Pan-Hellenic Association is an established order in most of the large co-educational universities of the United States. It makes rules as to when and how pledges are to be secured by the different sororities, and enforces strict penalties for their violation, at times compelling all new members to be forfeited. It also aims to secure closer relationship between the sororities and the college faculty.

Some time before college opens next fall, the local association will meet and formulate rules. It is probable that no "rushings" will be allowed until a certain specified date after college opens.
