DYING NEGRO
LYNCHED BY
FRENZIED MOB

After Being Shot Was Hanged,
Throat Cut and Body
Burned

Meridian, Miss., April 13.—Tom
O'Neill, the negro who shot and
killed Jailer Temple here today, was
himself shot and killed by officers
in a fight in the basement of the
Jail. A crowd of nearly 2,000 peo-
ple took O'Neill from the officers be-
fore he died, carried him to a tele-
graph pole and hanged him. After-
wards the body was lowered, the
throat cut and the clothing saturat-
ed with kerosene and set on fire.
Temple was killed by O'Neill when
the jailer went to the assistance of
a deputy whose revolver the negro
had seized.

SERIOUS FIRE IN
CONNECTICUT CITY

New Haven, April 13.—Fire al-
most destroyed the New Haven
County Jail today, following the
burning of wooden buildings adjoin-
ing, occupied by the New England
Chair company. Six firemen are
missing and five were injured.

CHICAGO JUDGE
SAYS DRUNKARDS
NOT CRIMINALS

Wants the Inebriated Treated
With Kindness by the
Police

Chicago, April 13.—Is it right to
class a drunken man as a criminal?
Municipal Judge McKenzie gives
an emphatic "no" to the question
and has set his foot on a movement
for the uplift of drinking men. Here
are some of the recommendations
and views he set forth in a letter to
Mayor Busse:
"That every intoxicated man who
is merely helpless and not noisy or
disturbing the peace be accompanied
to his residence by an officer, in-
stead of being locked in the police
station.
"The purpose of the police depart-
ment should be to do the most good
for the greatest number of persons.
"It will promote a spirit of kind-
ness, rather than revenge to arrest
a man for drunkenness and only
savors of revenge.
"For a man to be brought home
by an officer will have as great a
moral effect as to take him to the
police station."

HARTRIDGE IS
ACCUSED OF
CROOKED WORK

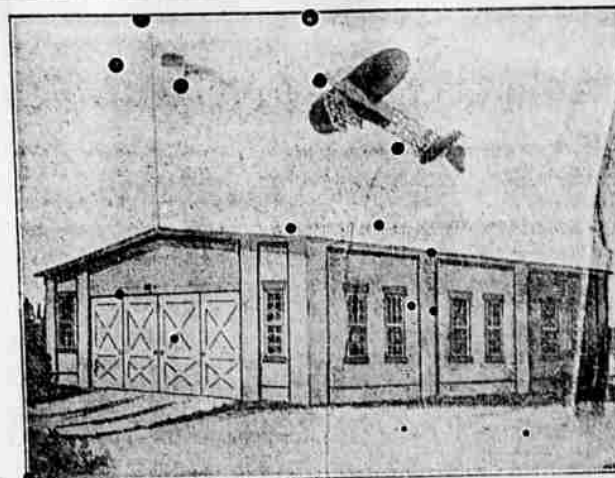
Attorney for Harry Thaw Must
Now Face a Perjury
Charge

New York, April 13.—Clifford W.
Hartridge, one of the attorneys who
defended Harry Thaw on his first
trial for the murder of Stanford
White failed today in his effort to
collect from Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw,
the prisoner's mother, a balance of
\$32,000 for counsel fees and dis-
bursements. More than that, Judge
Holt of the United States circuit
court, in denying the motion to set
aside the sealed verdict of the jury,
which had heard Hartridge's suit
against Mrs. Thaw, made the sen-
sational statement that an inquiry
had been called for regarding the
professional conduct of Hartridge,
and to determine whether ground
existed for a perjury prosecution.

DR. COOK'S ROUTE
WAS IMPOSSIBLE

Fairbanks, April 13.—The
Fairbanks-Mount McKinley
expedition that reached the
summit of the peak started
to follow the route alleged to
have been taken by Dr. Cook
and were obliged to abandon
it as impassable. Thomas
Lloyd, leader of the expedi-
tion, says no trace of Cook's
camp was found and he de-
clares the doctor's story of
his four days' ascent a pure
myth.

Lloyd's party took photographs of
the summit and of all points along
the trail. They also established a
trail, so well that it can be fol-
lowed by parties next summer. An-
eroid measurement taken by the
men places the height of the moun-
tain at 20,500 feet.

HASTY PARDON
FOR SLAYERS
OF CARMACK

Governor of Tennessee Stands
Pat With His Political
Friends

Nashville, April 18 —
Governor Patterson has par-
doned Colonel Cooper.

Nashville, April 13.—The supreme
court today affirmed the verdict of
the case of the state against Colonel
Duncan B. Cooper and son Robin,
as to Colonel Cooper, but reversed
the lower court as to Robin. Both
men were sentenced in the lower
court to twenty years imprisonment
for the murder of Senator Carmack
on November 9, 1908.

Today's decision means that Col-
onel Cooper, 65 years of age, must
serve a sentence of twenty years un-
less pardoned. The case of Robin
was remanded to the lower court
and now stands in a position simi-
lar to that before he was given his sec-
ond trial.

Pardon Excites Nashville.
Nashville, April 13.—The par-
don so soon after the decision has caused
a sensation. Friends of the late Sen-
ator Carmack are indignant over the
hasty action of the governor, and
the matter is discussed by excited
groups on the streets.

Washington, April 13.—The com-

WILL BE NO STANDARD

Washington, April 13.—No stand-
ardization of system for the ap-
portionment of the United States, which
fluctuates annually from 26,000,000
to 68,000,000 barrels will be pro-
vided during the present session of
