PROMINENT CITIZENS IN POLICE COURT

Two Assessed \$5 Each for Auto Speeding and Four Others Are Cited to Appear

Six of the ten persons whose names were taken by the officers for speeding their automobiles last Sunday faster than the city ordinance allows, have their names on the police records, and two of them, J. A. Seavey, the hop dealer, and Elmer Paine, bank clerk, were each fined \$5 by Judge Bryson this morning. The others, L. R. Watis, of the Utah Construction Company; Fred Moulien, the automobile dealer; C. S. Frank, the retired merchant, and Richard Moon, son of ex-Councilman W. S. Moon, have been cited to appear and will do so at their convenience.

The limit of speed for automobiles outside the fire limits is fifteen miles per hour, and inside the limits it is twelve miles.

For a long time autoists have disregarded this ordinance, and there have been a number of narrow escapes lately on account of the excessive speed of the autos. Sunday Chief of Police Farrington stationed three officers along East Eleventh street with stop watches, with the result that a number of offenders were caught. The chief says that had the weather been pleasant he would have got twice as many, as the cold weather Sunday kept many from venturing out with their machines.

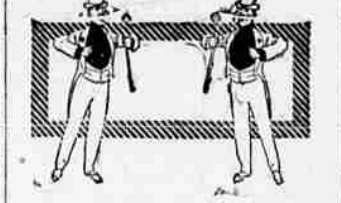
The comet rose this morning at 4:14 o'clock, but as far as known no one here has yet seen it.

JEWELL FILTER MAN HERE WITH PLANS

Minor Changes Will Be Made in Them and They Will be on Exhibition

M. Sisserville, of the New York Jewell Filter Company, manufacturer of the filter proposed by the city council to install in Eugene, was in the city today with plans and specifications of the filter. After receiving suggestions as to changes, he will have new plans drawn, and will return some time next week, at which time the plans will be on public exhibition.

The filter will be installed in a building 50x55 feet, and there will be four units used at present, foundations being built for two more to be used when the growth of the city demands it. The water plant at Oregon City is equipped with the Jewell filters, and as everybody knows, the water there has been pronounced time and again as being absolutely pure. The filters have been in use there for nine years, and are as effective now as when they were first installed.

WILL BEGIN SURVEYING FOR LOOP TOMORROW

Manager Lambirth Getting Ready to Construct Line Around College Hill

Manager J. L. Lambirth, of the P. E. & E., will start his crew of surveyors at work on the proposed College Hill loop tomorrow morning. Engineer H. W. Libby, of this city, who surveyed the loop in Fairmount, will have charge of the work, and will have half a dozen men under him.

The bonus is practically raised, although there are a few men who will have to be seen before the subscription paper can be closed up and handed over to the railway officials. It is expected that actual construction work will begin about May 1, or possibly before.

R. M. Day is grading his lot on West Seventh street, on which he will erect a frame building for a plumbing shop.

C. A. Wintermeier, D. L. Cartwell and H. E. Slattery, appraisers of the estate of Mrs. Mary Gruber, deceased, have filed their inventory with the probate court, appraising the property at \$3500.

The county is about to open a road across the tracks to give access to Kincaid park.

Articles of incorporation of the Pir Lumber company were filed with the county clerk today. The principal place of business is Cottage Grove and the capital stock is \$50,000. The incorporators are J. H. Chambers, A. B. Wood and J. B. Protzman. The objects of the corporation are to manufacture lumber. They will erect a big mill along the line of the Oregon & South-eastern railway.
