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COMMISSION GOVERNMENT EXPLAINED

East Eugene Improvement Club Holds Mass Meeting — Not Against Administration

The meeting of the East Eugene Improvement Club at Hardesty's hall last night was a tame affair compared to what was expected by some who attended, and judging from the call printed in the morning paper, which was taken by many to be a slam at the city council, many thinking that the meeting last night was to have been an anti-administration gathering, but those who expected to see any pyrotechnics were disappointed. The meeting was simply for the discussion of the commission government, and there was no semblance of friction except along toward the latter part of the meeting, when Dugald Campbell accused the officers of the club of being against the present council and stated that if the commission plan of government, embodying the recall, were in force now the officers would have the mayor and council ousted at once. President Van Boskirk and the secretary objected to the remarks, and stated emphatically that they were not in favor of recalling any of the members of the present council, and that they were not in any way opposed to the mayor and councilmen, but that they were opposed to the present system of government as provided by law.

Attorney Slattery's Plan

The meeting was called to order by President Van Boskirk, who read the constitution of the club and introduced Attorney H. E. Slattery, who had been engaged to tell of the workings of the commission plan of government in Des Moines, Iowa, where he was at one time the city attorney. He stated that as he understood it, this meeting was not for the purpose of charging the mayor or council with graft or dishonesty in the official discharge of their duties, but for the purpose of discussing and being enlightened upon a better form of city government than the present one. Mr. Slattery gave the history of the law in Iowa requiring that cities adopt this form of government, and features of the law were explained as follows:

In Des Moines there is a mayor and four commissioners, the mayor receiving a salary of \$3500 and the commissioners \$3000 each.

In cities of Eugene's class the salaries are \$1200 for the mayor and \$900 for the commissioners.

In Des Moines they devote their entire time to the city's business, and meet every day.

The plan centralizes the responsibility, and when there is a complaint or a measure the people want to put through there are no long waits and delays for it to be referred to committees and then probably reported to the council unfavorably. Instead, the matter is taken up immediately and either acted upon favorably or unfavorably.

Statements of the financial condition of the city were made at regular intervals, and the people by that means know just where every cent goes and where every cent comes from.

The mayor and commissioners at Des Moines are among the most successful business men of the city.

All franchises to corporations are referred to a vote of the people.

If the commission refuses to pass an ordinance which the people petition for, it can be referred to a vote of the people for decision.

A civil service commission is provided for and all city employees must pass an examination.

How to Adopt Plan

Mr. Slattery explained the manner in which any city might adopt the commission plan. He stated that one way is to get up a petition and secure the names of 15 per cent of the voters in the city, then file the petition with the city recorder, who must take up the matter with the council, and the council order an election to decide the matter. Mr. Slattery stated that it would be practically impossible to install such a government here before the time of the next annual election, in April, 1911, and has serious doubts as to whether it would then carry. In some cities in the Middle West it has been necessary to hold several elections before the people would adopt the system.

Cedar Rapids Plan

President Van Boskirk spoke of the working of the plan at Cedar Rapids. There the commission publishes a regular bulletin, giving in detail every item of expenditure of the city's money.

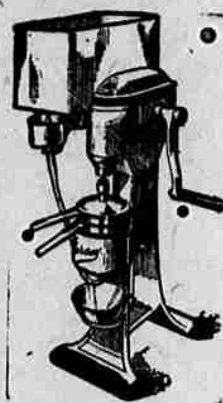
In that city since the plan has been adopted the city has bought an island for its municipal buildings, has cleaned up the streets and is growing into one of the most beautiful cities of the United States. The tax rate has decreased considerably and the rate will be still lower next year.

School Superintendent Guy C. Stockton, Rev. J. J. Morris and W. H. Noles also spoke briefly. Mr. Morris doubted the wisdom of substituting any new form of government for the present, giving the reason that the commission plan is yet only an experiment. He thought the people of Eugene ought to stand with the council until it has carried out its plan to give the city a supply of pure water.
