OLIVER'S MEETING

AT ASHLAND NOT
GREAT SUCCESS

Some of the Churches Withdrew
After Meeting Began—A
Practical Joke

Ashland, Or., April 17.—The Oliver revivals reached an anti-climax last night, as a result of a practical joke played by some one, for the apprehension of whom the evangelist offered a reward of \$150 before dismissing his congregation hurriedly.

The revivals were held in the Chautauqua tabernacle. In the midst of the service last night, the revivalist suddenly pressed his handkerchief to his nose, and seemed to be in distress. The congregation was not long in doubt what ailed him. An undefinable, but not vague odor, permeated the building. Almost in no time it became oppressive. Oliver reviled the perpetrators for a time. At length he gave up and dismissed the meeting.

It was necessary to fumigate the building this morning before the regular Sunday services could be held.

There has been division of opinion in Ashland over the Oliver revivals. The ministers of the evangelical churches united in bringing Oliver here four weeks ago, but some of them formally withdrew after the meetings began and some of the others gave half-hearted support. Members of secret societies have not been friendly toward Oliver because of the violence of his language toward their orders. Oliver's methods were peculiar, and in many quarters met with frank disapproval.

MINISTER TELLS FLOCK TO STAY AWAY

Medford, Or., April 17.—The South Methodist minister of this place has requested his congregation not to attend the revival meeting of Evangelist Oliver, who begins a six-weeks' revival here tomorrow. Some of the people of Ashland recently took exception to remarks made by the evangelist, and demanded a public apology of the ministerial body of that place.

"The Gingerbread Man," a comic opera of an unusual school, will give lovers of musical entertainments a chance to satisfy their cravings when this piece is presented here Tuesday April 19.

This pretty opera is in a class by itself and is totally unlike anything that we have been accustomed to in a comic opera line, which, by the way, is so much preferable to the usual musical comedy offering.

To the charming little story of legendary characters is added comedy that appeals to the intelligence, yet absolutely funny, music that is charming throughout, costuming attractive, and scenery that is a delight to the eye. In fact, the Gingerbread Man has no difficulty in finding a vogue wherever it has been presented. There is just enough story to interest and with a touch of sentiment and a dash of travesty, the whole is served up in such a novel way that one is continually delighted with every phase and turn.

"The Gingerbread Man," while it is far from perfect in character, the story is treated in such a unique way that it is more like a high class travesty, and the clever badinage the satirical turn of the dialogue, and the epigrammatic that pervades it, appeals more to the intelligent than to the community than to those who have horse play, boy comedy, and the suggestive style of entertainment so much in vogue of late. The story is pretty and enough to interest, the characters create interest for themselves, the moment they appear on the stage, and the music is a charm. Mr. A. Baldwin Sloane, who is responsible for it, has a national reputation for success in the lighter compositions, and he has yet to score a failure in anything he has written. His music finds a place in many private libraries, side by side with those of the great masters, and while it has a pleasing lilt, it is absolutely without flaw from the point of view of a musician. The numbers for which Mr. Sloane is responsible in "The Gingerbread Man" are: "The Beautiful Land of Bon-Bon," "Mazie," "Every Little Something," "Do You Believe in Santa Claus?" "Moon, Moon," "Old Rameez," and many others of infinite charm.

The scene of the play is laid in the mythical land of Bon-Bon, and is in two acts, and one can readily assume that there is a charm in the locality. The characters are: "Machi Vallus," "Fudge," "Jack Horner," "Mazie Bon Bon," "The Gingerbread Man," "Fairy Queen," "King Bun," and "The Wise Man," "Marjorie Daw," and "Simple Simon." They offer no end of entertainment and comic interpretations.

The singing is unusual but the music is at all times appealing, and while brilliant, it is yet of the class that appeals to all, owing to the beautiful melody that pervades it throughout.

PENDLETON PLANS

TO RISE WITH SUN
AND SAVE AN HOUR

Pendleton, Or., April 17.—"Conservation of daylight" is being agitated in Pendleton, and if a plan outlined by the city council last night by Leon Cohen, a prominent merchant, is adopted, the people of this city may set their clocks one hour ahead, and thus make the day's activities begin with sunrise.

Cohen declares that civilized man is a slave to clocks, and that all his actions are governed by the hands of the dial rather than by the sun. Thus, he says, is one hour of daylight in the morning wasted. By the proposed plan, the citizens would be able to have the latter part of daylight for recreation.

The council has taken the proposal under advisement for a week, and in the meantime Cohen will take it up with the Commercial club and try to secure its endorsement. The attitude of the people at large is favorable. The plan is a new one in this state, but is in vogue in England and Cincinnati and several other cities of the United States.

FIVE MILLION

DOLLARS STOLEN
FROM RAILROAD

Chicago, April 17.—Five million dollars is declared today to be a not extravagant estimate of the sum that the Illinois Central has lost in a swindle that a detective agency is investigating.

Although the sum that the railroad is alleged to have lost early was set at \$1,000,000, the revelations made by the inquiry of the detectives put upon the case by President J. T. Harahan, declared to have raised this figure until now it is nearer \$5,000,000.

W. J. Burns, the San Francisco graft investigator, and 75 operatives under him are doing the work, which covers a period of four years' speculations and has reached to nearly every city upon the system of the Illinois Central railroad.

An interesting sidelight upon the affairs of the Illinois Central is that within the past year there has been almost an entire reorganization of the official family, the old officials having given away to new ones.

The schooner Oakland left Sunday for Coos Bay after being bar bound for considerable time. She took out what lumber the Oregon & California Co. had and will finish her cargo at Coos Bay.

The first shipment of butter sent from the creamery here this spring, was carried out on the Willamette this week. The creamery company is planning to ship out by water this year, and get the benefit of cheaper transportation.

The directors of the McLeod district have engaged Miss Fannie Colvin to teach a three months' term for school in their district, after the school in Florence closes. Miss Colvin is now teaching her second year here and has given good satisfaction.

Logging operations are soon to be commenced across the river from Florence. Quite a large body of timber adjoining the townsite of Glenada on the west, is to be cut off and sawed into lumber to build houses for the people who are purchasing lots in that rapidly growing town.

The gasoline schooner, Wilhelmnia, arrived here Monday afternoon. The vessel left Portland last week with a full load of freight for different places along the coast. We understand there is another load now in Portland ready for her next trip. The prospect now is that the boat will be kept busy on the run.—Florence West.
