FOREIGN PROPERTY

HAS BEEN BURNT

Riots of Chinese Result in the Death of Governor of Province

Changshu, China, April 18.—All of the foreign owned buildings in Changshu have been destroyed by fire, except the British Consulate. All the buildings rented by foreigners have been looted.

All foreigners have left the city. So far as known no foreign resident lost his life.

The Governor of Hunan province, Wu Tehung Siu, and his son, were killed, and several other government officials fled. Even yet a section of the city is in flames. Six thousand foreign drilled soldiers are stationed here and a few of these protected the governor's house for a time, but soon all joined the rioters.

Famine Sufferers Loot.
The riots began April 13, when the famine sufferers looted the rice depots. A captain of police was wounded trying to restore order. Thousands crowded around him and his assistants and he was obliged to flee to the Yamen. The rioters followed and besieged the place all night.

The following day the disturbance became anti-foreign. The Chinese inland mission and the Norwegian and Catholic missions were burned. The other missions were destroyed April 15. The missionaries attached to the American Episcopal Missionary Alliance, the United Evangelical church and the Wesleyan and Yale Scientists, numbering 41 in all, took refuge in boats. They left all their effects.

Foreign Property Destroyed.
The destruction of all foreign property, including the Japanese consulate and the British warehouses, followed. The fate of the Standard Oil Company's newly erected tanks is unknown.

EXPLORER COOK

FOUND IN EXILE

To Party of Americans in Interior of Chile North Pole Famer Amdits His Identity

Trenton, N. J., April 18.—According to former state comptroller William S. Hancock, who has just returned from a tour of South America, Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the discredited Arctic explorer, is living in a small village named Chillascoles, on the Chilean side of the Andes. His wife is with him.

When the party of which Hancock was a member arrived at Chillascoles the natives were talking of two American strangers whom they believed to be fugitives from justice.

One member of Hancock's party was certain that the strangers were Mr. and Mrs. Cook. An inquiry was made and Cook admitted his identity. He declined to discuss any of the charges made against him by members of the various geographical societies. He seemed to be gloomy and was determined to be as much alone as possible. Mrs. Cook also seemed much depressed.

Members of the party who had seen Cook when he left New York, said he showed considerable change.

IOWA FRUIT CROP

INJURED BY FROST

Des Moines, Ia., April 18.—Secretary Wesley Greene, of the Iowa State Horticultural Department, today estimated that the loss of Iowa's fruit and vegetables from the freezing weather, will be between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000.

He asserts that the early frosts, cherries and plums in particular, have been totally destroyed.

A BRAVE SOLDIER

MUSTERED OUT

George W. Crawford, One of the Famous Privates of the Civil War

Sergeant George W. Crawford, 73 years old, who is said to have taken part in more battles during the Civil War than any other individual soldier, is dead at the family home at 1508 Fremont street, north side. At the close of the war Sergeant Crawford was given honorable mention by President Abraham Lincoln for his conspicuous bravery. He was born in Ohio township, Allegheny county, and lived with his parents until the outbreak of the Civil war. In September, 1861 he enlisted in this city under Captain S. B. M. Young, as a private in Company B, Fourth Pennsylvania Volunteer Cavalry. Sergeant Crawford distinguished himself for bravery in the following engagements:

Siege of Yorktown, Williamsburg, Fair Oaks, Seven Pines, Oak Grove, Mechanicsville, Gaines Mills, Savage Station, Peach Orchard, White Oak Swamp, Glendale, Malvern Hill, Harrison's Landing, Antietam, Fredericksburg, Kelley's Ford, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Warrenton Sulphur Springs, Catlett Station, Battle of the Wilderness, Spotsylvania, North Ann, Totopotomoy Station, St. Mary's Church, Petersburg, Weldon Railroad, Deep Bottom, Strawberry Plains, Boydton Road, Hatcher's Run, Dinwiddie, C. H., Sutherland Station, Sailor's Creek and Appomattox, and was present at General Lee's surrender.

For his bravery Mr. Crawford was made corporal and later sergeant. He was made a prisoner of war and served five and one-half months in Libby prison, and was paroled December 29, 1863.

At the close of the war he returned to Pittsburgh and May 30, 1867 was married to Miss Sarah Duff, who died November 12, 1872. He remarried two years later to Miss Kate Mason, who with four sons, Harry D. William F. Albert M. and George W. Crawford, and two daughters, Mrs. Blanch Stolbert of Mr. Washington and Mrs. Anna Santimyen of Beachview, survive. He is also survived by seven brothers.

Robert Crawford of Wells Neada, Adam Crawford of Walworthville, Ore., Hugh Crawford, Canton, Penn., Louis Crawford of North Side; John Crawford of Parnassus; and Chas. and Hiram Crawford of Emaworth. He was a member of J. B. Clark Post No. 162, G. A. R. and Union Veteran Legion No. 6, and the Allegheny County Prisoners of War Association.

ACCUSED WEZLER

MAY PROVE ALIBI

Portland, Or., April 18.—Confirming the declaration of Charles J. Wezler, accused of the murder of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Henry Schulz, that he would be able to prove an alibi, two witnesses in this city yesterday said positively that they talked with Wezler on Monday, April 4. This is the day on which the crime on the road leading to Glig harbor is believed to have been committed.

Ernest Traxler, piano player in the Arcade Theater, and B. Vincent, employed as a singer in the same place, are certain that Wezler was in this city on the day that Mrs. Schulz was lured to her death by a decoy letter. Both men say that, beyond doubt, they talked with Wezler in front of Ralph C. Knight's cigar store on Washington street Monday morning between 10:45 and 12 o'clock.
