### GREAT MASONIC DAY AT ROSEBURG

Eugene Members Take Prominent Part in Exercises of Dedication

Roseburg, Or., April 20.—Among the most notable events in Roseburg's history of fraternal bodies was the dedication here today of the fine four-story Masonic temple recently completed. It was an all-day and evening affair, for the visitors began to arrive on the early morning trains, and the special train from Eugene bearing 200 visitors, including Ivanhoe Commandery No. 2, of the Knights Templar, in full uniform. They were met by the local Shriner Knights, similarly attired and escorted up town, led by the Roseburg band and accompanied by a long line of members of the order and of the Eastern Star. The delegations from the south, arriving at 1:30 p. m., were likewise greeted by the local brethren upon their arrival at the depot, as were the arrivals from the north on the regular train at 9 a. m.

#### Afternoon Ceremonies.

The exercises of the afternoon were opened in the Entered Apprentice degree at the old lodge room. Thence followed a short parade under the escort of the Knights Templar, to music furnished by the Roseburg band. With the long line of members following, acting as an escort to the Grand Master, they occupied a space of several blocks. With the large representation of the Knights Templar in full uniform, the beautiful and emblematic banner of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, and the assemblage of distinguished citizens it evoked widespread interest and made an imposing spectacle. Col. W. H. Taylor and H. Guest wore the Red Fez of the Nobles of Mystic Shrine. There were several other Shriners present but they marched with the Knights Templar or the Blue Lodge members.

#### Dedication Services.

At the afternoon dedicatory ceremony, after assembling in the new temple, F. L. Davis, W. M. of Laurel Lodge, and Dexter Rice, acting Architect, made the presentation to the Grand Master and the grand officers present. The ode was sung and prayer offered by Rev. K. M. Mears, the acting Grand Chaplain. The formal dedicatory services were then fully carried out, dedicating this temple to Free Masonry and its sacred teachings.

#### History of Roseburg Lodge.

Hon. J. C. Fullerton, Past Grand Master recited briefly the story of the erection of Solomon's temple 3000 years ago, and the command to build. The history of Masonry in Douglas county began with the granting of a charter to Daniel Stewart and others to open a lodge at Winchester in August, 1857. The county seat having been moved to Roseburg, the lodge was also moved to this city. Its history since then has been a part of the history of the town. The establishment of this lodge was before the establishment of any church in this territory. Masonry, he said, had led in moral influence in the van of modern civilization in all parts of the world.

#### Address by Hon. S. M. Yoran.

"Influence of Masonry in Pioneer Progress" was the theme of Hon. S. M. Yoran, of Eugene, Past Grand Master. He recalled the struggle of the American patriots about 140 years ago, to gain their freedom from a foreign yoke. Also that all the signers (except one) of the immortal Declaration of Independence, were members of the Masonic order. Further, that every general in the armies of the Revolution was a Mason. This alone shows what a large influence Masonry has had toward the freedom of our country.

The establishment of Masonry in Oregon in 1850, was also related, and the first session of the Grand Lodge of Masons in Oregon, not long after, was composed of representatives of three lodges—the only ones which then existed north of the California boundary and west of the Rocky Mountains.

Some of the distinguished men who have gone out into the world as members of Laurel Lodge No. 13, of Roseburg, which is here celebrating the dedication of their splendid temple, were briefly extolled. Gov. S. F. Chadwick here became a Mason; Judge Fullerton, Past Grand Master, and Hon. Hinger Hermann, a congressman for 12 years, were also admitted and instructed in Masonry in this lodge. The speaker believes the world is growing better instead of worse. The march of progress is ever onward. Any individual effort against it is worse than futile. This institution of Masonry is devoted to the teaching of eternal truths. It adheres to the principles of fraternity, equality and liberty, above the dogmatic edicts of any earthly ruler. Its liberties will never degenerate into license. It has never been offered to any man in exchange for his religion. It has kept free from intolerance but has been doing a duty toward humanity beyond the power of human speech to portray. An eloquent tribute was also paid to the Order of Eastern Star, which is the ladies' auxiliary and co-worker with the vast army of Masons in the world today.

### COTTAGE GROVE LOCALS OF INTEREST

The extensive machinery for this big power station is beginning to arrive and will soon be placed on the grounds. It consists of two generators of 1200 horse power each and two turbine wheels of equal power. It is proposed to carry 22,000 volts over this line to Eugene and the plant will be completed and in operation by early fall. The plant will be modern throughout and will be the largest and most complete electric plant in the upper Willamette valley.—Leader.
