WANTS TO LOCATE CANNERY SOMEWHERE

Representative of St. Paul Company in Eugene Looking Over Situation

John S. Hughes, representing the Luce Land and Development Co., of St. Paul, Minn., is in Eugene investigating this city's advantage for the location of a fruit cannery which the company wishes to establish somewhere in this state. He was shown about by Manager Freeman, of the Commercial Club and he interviewed Secretary Holt of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association, which has recently purchased the Allen cannery of this city.

The Luce Land and Investment Co. is a big concern and already owns and operates several canneries in the Northwest. An effort will be made to secure the location of the plant here, as there is undoubtedly enough room for two.

CRESWELL MEN FORM COMPANY FOR CANNERY

Capital Stock Will be \$25,000, and Much of It Already Subscribed

A goodly number of business men and representative farmers of Creswell and surrounding country gathered in the rooms of the Development league Saturday afternoon for the purpose of organizing a company to operate a cannery at Creswell, and it is doubtful if ever an enterprise was launched here that received the unanimous support given the cannery. Every man present was heartily in favor of the project, as all could plainly see the value of the institution to this community.

F. W. Ogram, chairman of the committee appointed to secure acreage to grow vegetables and fruit for the cannery, reported that the committee had secured 25 acres positively and five additional acres conditionally. During the meeting E. L. Barnett pledged one acre of vegetables and Mr. Groesbeck two acres of sweet corn.

After a lengthy discussion it was moved and carried that a company be organized to operate a cannery, the capital stock to be \$25,000 and the shares \$5.00. Each individual is limited to 20 shares. A canvass of the meeting was then ordered for takers of stock with the result that \$630 was raised toward the project.
