GENERAL WOOD

IS CHIEF OF STAFF

Army Doctor, of Rough-Rider Fame, Commands United States Army

Washington, April 22.—Maj.-Gen. Leonard Wood, the celebrated "army doctor," who was first colonel of Roosevelt's "Rough Riders," today assumed his duties of chief of staff, succeeding Maj.-Gen. J. Franklin Bell. Gen. Wood has been in command of the Department of the East, with headquarters at New York.

Although, like Major General F. C. Almsworth, the Adjutant-General of the army, General Wood is not a West Pointer, and "rose from the Medical Corps," the army is beginning to forget this. Army officers in

Washington generally commend the selection. Even those who have little faith in any officer who has not passed through West Point say he appears to be the best available officer for the post, with the possible exception of Brig.-Gen. Arthur Murray, Chief of Artillery. General Murray was one of the first war department officials to wire General Wood his congratulations.

"General Wood is one of the best military men in the world today," said General Murray, "and I don't think there is a better man for the place. I appreciate the efforts of my friends to obtain the office for me, but I am glad General Wood is to have it. I have an important work of my own here in the Coast Artillery, and although I would have been pleased had the honor of the higher office fallen to me, as it is, I shall be content to remain in my present post and endeavor to solve the big problems we have before us for the extension of the great national system of coast fortification."

PENNANT RACE OPENS

St. Joseph Fans Crowd Grounds to Witness Professional Ball

St. Joseph, Mo., April 22.—When the cry of "Play ball!" resounds from the local park this afternoon, ushering in the Western League pennant race, St. Joe fans will see the first professional game in several years. For many seasons this city has had the doubtful distinction of being the largest city in the country without a club in a professional baseball organization. This year St. Joseph has succeeded in the Western League franchise held last year by Pueblo, Col., which finished last in the race. A strong aggregation of players has been secured by Jack Holland and if they put up a good quality of the national game, the baseball hungry fans promise a support that will be equal to that accorded any team in the league.

Today's opening game is with Des Moines, which grabbed last year's pennant by a narrow margin over Sioux City. Lincoln opens today at Denver, Sioux City at Topeka, and Omaha at Wichita.

All indications point to a great season in the Western. All of the teams have been strengthened since last year. One hundred and sixty-eight games will be played, the season closing on Oct. 3. Last year the clubs finished in the following order: Des Moines, Sioux City, Omaha, Topeka, Wichita, Denver, Lincoln, Pueblo.

Boston April 22.—Baseball on the New England League circuit begins today. Lawrence opening at Brockton, Lynn at Fall River, Worcester at Lowell and Haverhill at New Bedford. The cities represented in the league are the same as last year, when Worcester secured the pennant, with Brockton a close second and Lynn third.

London, April 22.—Sixteen plays will be performed during the Shakespeare festival at Stratford-on-Avon, the birthplace of England's greatest literary genius, beginning tonight when Sir Herbert Tree will give a production of "Hamlet."

Other features of the celebration, which has attracted an immense concourse of people of all nations to the historic town, include the following: Street decorations with heraldic devices, banners and festoons.

Floral processions to the poet's grave at Holy Trinity church tomorrow.

Old English games and sports, including wrestling, fancy skipping, Maypole and Morris dancing. Competition for folk dancers and music.

Exhibition of armor and heraldry illustrative of the period of the wars of the roses.

A reception of visitors by the president and members of the Shakespeare club tomorrow.

The plays to be given at the beautiful Shakespeare Memorial Theatre at Stratford-on-Avon include the following:

"Hamlet" with Sir Herbert Tree as the Prince in one revival and Martin Harvey in the part of another; "The Two Gentlemen of Verona," with Miss Nora Lancaster as Silvia; "The Winter's Tale," with Miss Nora Lancaster as Perdita and Mr. Benson as Leontes; "Much Ado About Nothing," with Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Bourchier, and afterward with Mr. Lewis Waller and Miss Winifred Emery as Benedick and Beatrice; "Coriolanus," with Miss Genevieve Ward as Vololumnia; "Julius Caesar," first with Mr. Benson as Marcus Antonius and afterward with Mr. Henry Ainley in the part; "Richard III," with Miss Genevieve Ward as Margaret, and the "Merchant of Venice," with Miss Ellen Terry as Portia, Mr. Otho Stuart as Bassanio, and Mr. James Carew as Shylock. Benmont and Fletcher's comedy, "The Knight of the Burning Pestle" will be given twice, and on the evening of Thursday, May 5, will be produced for the first time the successful play in the competition recently announced for a prize of 300 pounds, for which 315 pieces were submitted.
