THE DRAMA

New York, April 23.—Low Fields, is paying a pretty compliment to all of the players in town this afternoon, by giving a professional matinee of "The Yankee Girl," in which Blanche Ring has made such a splendid success. Many new features appropriate to the occasion have been arranged for Miss Ring and her guests at the Herald Square Theatre.

Miss Beatrice Forbes Robertson, the young English actress, for some months a member of the New Theatre Company, leaves that organization today and will travel through the Western States on a suffrage tour with Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt. Miss Forbes-Robertson says that she desires to study the conditions in the states where full suffrage is granted, and the first states to be visited are Colorado, Utah and Wyoming.

By way of giving an extra flip to the present theatrical season, Charles Frohman has decided that at the end of Ethel Barrymore's engagement at the Empire Theatre, he will make a splendid production of T. W. Robertson's comedy, "Caste," famed in its day as the most exquisite of so-called cup and saucer comedies, but known comparatively little to the present generation. "Caste" will have its first appearance at the Empire next Monday evening. The number of performances will be limited, but for the production Mr. Frohman has gathered together an unusual group of actors. The company will include Marie Tempest, G. P. Huntley, Elsie Ferguson, Graham Browne, Edwin Arden, Maud Milton and Julian Boyce. Miss Tempest, Mr. Browne and Mr. Royce will appear in the characters that they played during the recent revival of "Caste" at the St. James theatre, London.

Miss Olga Nethersole, who began a short season at the Academy of Music last Monday evening will play "Sappho" for the 2000th time tomorrow evening. Miss Nethersole is devoting all of this week to the play. Among the actors associated with her are Harrison Hunter, O. B. Clarence, Albert Perry, Hamilton Mott, W. Slatine Mills, Charlotte Tittell, Alice Gordon, Lillian Stafford and Constance Raymond.

The City Theatre, in East Fourteenth street, which was opened Monday evening with Miss Anna Held in "Miss Innocence" justifies the claims its managers have made of having built the prettiest playhouse in New York. Sullivan and Krause, who own several other theatres in the city, are the proprietors.

The City follows the modern style of theatre construction. Its seats spreading in front of the stage, like an open fan. Four tiers of boxes in rows of four extend on each side of the proscenium, two balconies and gallery with a gradual "dip," rise in the rear. The conveniences are ample and the safety devices are modern. The color scheme is a combination of rose and dull gold.

Clyde Fitch's last play, "The City" under the management of the Messrs. Shubert, is still the attraction at the Lyric theatre, where, according to all present indications, it will run for many months to come. This may justly be described as the most thrilling play of contemporaneous American urban life ever seen on any stage, presented by one of the most extraordinary companies ever organized in any country. The cast includes Walter Hampden, Tully Marshall, A. H. Stuart, Helen Holmes, Eva Vincent, Lucille Watson, Mary Nash, Edward Emery, George Howell, Jane Gell, John Jex and Fred Courtenay.

Mary Manning's engagement in Rachel Crother's play, "A Man's World," at the Comedy Theatre, under the management of the Messrs. Shubert, has been extended owing to the conspicuous success and will now in all probability, continue until the playhouse is closed for the summer. The production has received the combined endorsement of the most notable critics, the leading ministers and the public at large. The theme of the play is that of equal moral responsibility for the two sexes, but the manner in which the story is unfolded is entirely romantic, and not didactic or "preachy." Miss Manning's success in the stellar role is too well-known to require further comment.

"Seven Days" at the Astor has become the talk of the town in New York theatrics. Two hundred nights are now to its credit and no end of the run is in sight. One of the features of the run of "Seven Days" has been the many large theatre parties which have come in to see the play from all the suburban towns. Almost every night one or more of these parties is in evidence.

"The Fortune Hunter," the comedy in which John Barrymore appears in the leading part, remains at the Comedy theatre.

William H. Crane, resuming his New York season in George Ade's comedy, "Father and the Boys," which was interrupted last year by the comedian's illness, has returned to the Garrick theatre in his farewell performances of the role of Lemuel Morewood. This is the actor's third season in the comedy.
