### SPRINGFIELD TEAM LEADS THE LEAGUE

Won From Cottage Grove in a One-Sided Game—Eugene Loses At Albany

Springfield won its second game and Eugene lost its second of the Willamette Valley League series yesterday afternoon. Cottage Grove being Springfield's victim to the tune of 8 to 3, and Eugene falling before the weak Albany team by the close score of 7 to 6.

At Albany the winners drove in the deciding run in the last half of the ninth inning. Eugene having tied the score in the first half of that inning. Manager Smith, of Eugene, distinguished himself by securing four hits in five times at the bat, and he played an excellent fielding game besides. It was the opening game of the league season at Albany, and the band played and Dr. Davis, mayor of the city, pitched the first ball. Eugene's team is not as poor as its position would indicate. The players say at each game in which the team has played they have lost through hard luck more than anything else, and promise to make a better showing in the future. The personnel of the team shows some excellent material, and the team is really stronger than it appears. Eugene fans think the real race will be between Eugene and Springfield.

The game at Midway Park yesterday was all one-sided—too much so to make it interesting. The most interesting feature of the afternoon was a play on the side lines. Cottage Grove tried a new pitcher from Sacramento, Fields by name. He was batted all over the lot, and it was not until seven runs had been made by Springfield that he was yanked out and George Baker put in his place. Baker proved to be more of a puzzle and kept the score down, but by that time Springfield began to loaf and in the eighth inning, through a succession of errors and a few hits, Cottage Grove secured three runs. The run-getting was stopped by a beautiful catch in deep left field by Cooper, who caught the ball on the run and fell as he speared it, holding the ball in the air to show that he still had it. Another feature of the game was a home run by Jewett, chasing in a runner before him.

The officials of the league promise better order on the grounds at the games hereafter. There will be three officers on the grounds, and any one who makes a disturbance will be placed under arrest. The score follows:
