DR. CLARENCE TRUE WILSON SPEAKS AGAIN AT THE TABERNACLE

Second Address on "Chivalry of Oregon, or Why Oregon Is Going Dry"

Dr. Clarence True Wilson delivered his second address before a large audience at the tabernacle last evening on the subject, "The Chivalry of Oregon, or Why Oregon Is Going Dry." The speaker discussed in detail the objections which are being made to state-wide prohibition and answered a number of questions which are being raised in regard to the constitutional amendment to be voted upon next November. At the conclusion of the address opportunity was given to all who wished to buy stock in the "Oregon Free Press," the state organ of the prohibition forces, and the appeal met with liberal response.

Dr. Wilson spoke in substance as follows:

"One of the questions which I am frequently asked in this campaign is, 'What effect will this state-wide prohibition campaign have upon the present local option law should we be defeated in November?' In reply let me say that the present local option law and the proposed amendment are totally distinct. Should state-wide prohibition be defeated, the present local option law will remain the same."

"Another question was frequently asked is, 'Why continued to keep everybody stirred up on this question?' No moral question is ever settled until it is settled right. Unsettled moral questions have no mercy on the peace of nations. Then too, agitation is better than stagnation. The church exists to give this world no rest so long as there are wrongs to be righted. The liquor question gets its hope of immortality from a still church."

"When Oregon really wants to strike a death blow to the liquor, our people will not fool around the state for a few joints that maintain a precarious existence selling a few drinks while dodging law officers. The power that owns three-fourths of Portland's saloons, makes and unmakes judges, sheriffs, corrupt legislators, violates law in dry territory and in wet alike, is the small group of smooth capitalists who pile up millions as the price of their shame, who advertise whiskey as a boon, and bear as a food and a blessing to old people and to nursing mothers."

"If you want to stop this stream of corruption at its source and make the enforcement of prohibition easy, vote for the amendment and enforcement bill that stops all manufacture of liquid hell in our state."
